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I.-DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul. 43, WD, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Medal (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility during the period indicated was awarded on 2 August 1941 to the following-named officer:

Major General Adna R. Chaffee, , United States Army. For service in organizing and commanding the Armored Force of the Army.

II. SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul. 43, WD, 1918), the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the periods indicated is awarded to the following-named officer and enlisted man:

Colonel Grattan H. McCafferty, , Infantry, United States Army (then 22d Infantry Regiment, Philippine Army), displayed gallantry in action against the enemy on 2, 3, and 4 January 1942. As senior instructor, 22d Infantry Regiment, Philippine Army, his heroic actions in directing the defense of this regiment at Porac, Pampanga, Luzon, were such as to warrant the approbation of the Commanding General, 21st Division, who awarded him this citation.

Master Sergeant Pierce H. Wade (Army serial No.) (then first lieutenant, O2031912, Army of the United States), Ordnance Department, United States Army, displayed gallantry in action at Caligaman, Bataan, on 10 July 1942. With all but two of the American personnel in his force sick with malaria, dysentery, and beri-berl, Sergeant Wade, accompanied by one of his men, slipped into a Japanese hospital in the enemy-occupied town of Caligaman, Bataan, on the night of 10 July 1942, and secured supplies of sulpha, quinine, various injections, syringes, and medical appurtenances that were the means of saving many lives. Discovered by the enemy in the town, Sergeant Wade, killing a number of the enemy, successfully fought through to safety with the strategic materials. Through his courage and daring as shown in this bold venture, Sergeant Wade revealed marked intrepidity and outstanding devotion to duty exemplary of the highest tradition of the United States Army.

I, Bul. 54, WD, 1942), the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the periods indicated is awarded to the following-named officers and enlisted men:

Master Sergeant Pierce H. Wade (Army serial No.) (then first lieutenant, O2031912, Army of the United States), Ordnance Department, United States Army. 9 April to 5 May 1943.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 20 July 1942 (sec. III, Bul. WD, 40, 1942) and Executive Order 9260, 29 October 1942 (sec. I, Bul. 54, WD, 1942), the Legion of Merit (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Lieutenant Colonel Orlando O. Troxel. Jr., (then colonel), Field Artillery, United States Army. June 1944 to March 1945.

IV_BRONZE STAR MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 (sec. II, Bul. 3, WD, 1944), the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period indicated is awarded posthumously to the following-named officer:

Second Lieutenant Nathan A. Aronovitz, , Field Artillery, Army of the United States, a member of the 46th Field Artillery Battalion, distinguished himself by courageous action against the enemy in Luxembourg on 18 January 1945. Attached to Company L, 10th Infantry Regiment, as artillery observer, he crossed the Sauer River and supplied prompt artillery support wherever needed. When the enemy counterattacked with tanks and infantry, he swiftly located the artillery fire on the map and sent coordinates over the radio, adjusted the artillery fire on the enemy, completely routed them, and enabled the Infantry to advance. Lieutenant Aronovitz's efforts were a material contribution to the success of this engagement.

VI..BRONZE STAR MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 (sec. II, Bul. 3, WD, 1944), the Bronze Star Medal (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Captain Frank W. Connor. Jr., (then first lieutenant), Infantry, Army of the United States, distinguished himself by heroic achievement, on 20 September 1944, while serving with the 3d Reconnaissance Troop, 3d Infantry Division, In France. As commander of the Division Battle Patrol, he was directed smash an enemy road block and to push on in an endeavor to determine the enemy strength and disposition. Captain Connor led and directed the patrol in the aggressive execution of this hazardous mission, successfully destroying the road block and driving a wedge 2 miles into enemy territory.
