## DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY WASHINGTON 25, D. C., 24 September 1948

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1..DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul. 43, WD, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action against an enemy during the periods indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Colonel Amado Bautista, (then captain), Corps of Engineers, Philippine Army, displayed extraordinary heroism while in the performance of his duties, as commanding officer of the 11th Engineer Battalion, in action against the enemy at San Juan, La Union, on 21 December 1941; at Klondykes and Camp One, Pangasinan, on 23 December 1941; at Concepcion, Tarlac, on 28 December 1941; at Guagua and Lubao, Pampanga, on 3-4 January 1942; and at other times and places in the 11th Division sector, where need was greatest and enemy pressure strongest.

11...SILVER STAR.—1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul. 43, WD, 1918), the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named enlisted man:

Private Raumundo T. Padua (Army serial No. ), Medical Department (Philippine Scouts), Army of the United States, a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Service Company, 12th Medical Battalion (Philippine Scouts), displayed gallantry in action on 26 April 1942 at Corregidor. During heavy artillery fire, Private Padua courageously administered first aid to wounded soldiers at Middle Side Barracks and evacuated them under shell fire without regard for his personal safety.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (Bul. 43, WD, 1918), the Silver Star (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for gallantry in action during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Colonel Herschel D. Baker, (then lieutenant colonel), Field Artillery, United States Army, a member of the 601st Tank Destroyer Battalion, displayed gallantry in action near Sbeitla, Tunisia, on 17 February 1948. When a large number of enemy tanks threatened to complete a double envelopment of his command, Colonel Baker went forward under very heavy tank fire and, standing in an exposed position, coolly supervised the orderly withdrawal of the battalion.

III.LEGION OF MERIT.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 20 July 1942 (sec. III, Bul. 40, WD, 1942) and Executive Order 9260, 29 October 1942 (sec. I, Bul. 54, WD, 1942), the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer: Major General James A. Lester, United States Army. May 1945 to July 1948.

IV.-SOLDIER'S MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 2 July 1926 (Bul. 8, WD, 1926), the Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy during the period 4GO 510B—Sept. 800535°—48

indicated was awarded by the War Department, on 4 October 1941, to the following-named officer:

Captain Lowell E. Mix, , United States Air Force (then staff sergeant (Army serial No. 6974298), Medical Department, United States Army), displayed heroism in assisting in rescuing an enlisted man from drowning in Little Neck Bay, Fort Totten, New York, on 18 May 1941. When an enlisted man overturned in a boat about 50 yards from shore and was in grave danger of drowning, Captain Miw (then staff sergeant) and four enlisted men, upon seeing the man struggling in the water, with utter disregard of their safety, jumped into the rough water and swam out to him. With great difficulty, they succeeded in bringing the unconscious man to shore, where he was revived by means of artificial respiration, thereby saving his life. The heroism displayed by Captain Miw on this occasion reflects great credit on himself and the military service.

V.-BRONZE STAR MEDAL.—1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 (sec. II, Bul. 3, WD, 1944), the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the periods indicated is awarded to the following-named officers and enlisted man:

Technician Fourth Grade Joseph C. Calvin (Army serial No. ), Coast Artillery Corps, United States Army, 23 February 1945.

Captain David T. Sheeku. (then second lieutenant), Transportation Corps, Army of the United States. 26 April to 30 June 1944.

Lieutenant Colonel Kiong F. Tom. (then major), Quartermaster Corps, Army of the United States. October 1942 through March 1945.

Commander Robert E. Vining, United States Naval Reserve. 20
October to 14 November 1944.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 (sec. II, Bul. 3, WD, 1944), the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

First Lieutenant Joseph D. Wallace, Infantry, Army of the United States. 22 January 1948.

VI. BRONZE STAR MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 (sec. II, Bul. 3, WD, 1944), the Bronze Star Medal (second Oak-Leaf Cluster) for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Lieutenant Colonel Arthur H. Wilson, Jr., Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic action against the enemy at Caylayway, Southern Luzon, Philippine Islands, on 2 February 1945. During an attack on strongly fortified enemy positions, the two assault companies of his battalion met stiff enemy resistance from several small suicidal units armed with automatic weapons. Colonel Wilson made a personal reconnaissance of his right flank and from a small ridge located the enemy positions which were in an area of rugged terrain. With his battalion S-3, he crept upon the enemy and single-handedly destroyed the position with grenades and pistol fire, thereby permitting the advance of his battalion without further casualties. The exemplary heroism and fearless leadership of Colonel Wilson reflect great credit on himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.
