1.-DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS.—1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 43, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action against an enemy during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Colonel (then lieutenant colonel) Halstead C. Fowler, Field Artillery, United States Army, displayed extraordinary heroism in action against the enemy in the Moron Sector, Bataan, Philippine Islands, on 21 January 1942.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 43, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Cross (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for extraordinary heroism in action against an enemy during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Colonel (then lieutenant colonel) Halstead O. Fowler,
United States Army, displayed extraordinary heroism in action, on 24 December 1941, at the Agno River, Luzon, Philippine Islands. While serving as commander of a unit designated to cover the withdrawal of troops, Colonel Fowler, sensing impending panic and disorder among the withdrawing troops which would have resulted in the annihilation by an enemey force overwhelmingly superior in number, without regard for his personal safety, fearlessly exposed himself to oncoming vehicles propelled by armed, fear-crazed drivers and, under intense enemy fire succeeded in reorganizing the troops into orderly fighting groups, thus permitting successful completion of the mission. The exemplary heroism displayed by Colonel Fowler in the face of enemy fire and his constant, fearless leadership under adverse conditions reflect great credit on himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

II._SILVER STAR.—1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 48, 1918), the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the period indicated is awarded to the followingnamed officer:

First Lieutenant Oharles H. Marcy,

States, displayed heroism while serving as pilot of a B-17 aircraft on a combat mission to Berlin, Germany, on 29 April 1944. Just prior to bombs away, Lieutenant Marcy was wounded by a burst of flak, but he continued to fly the airplane and drop bombs on the target. Forced out of formation, the bomber was attacked by enemy fighters, which set it aftre, and Lieutenant Marcy was wounded again. Despite his painful wounds, Lieutenant Marcy held the airplane in level flight while the crew made good their escape. The cool courage and heroic devotion to duty displayed by Lieutenant Marcy on this occasion reflect the highest credit on himself and the Army Air Forces.

Sergeant Ronald K. Bowman (Army service No.) (then private first class), Transportation Corps (then Infantry), United States Army, a member of Company F, 328th Infantry Regiment, displayed gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany on 17 February 1945. During an attack on enemy positions within the city blocks of Fraulautern, his platoon was caught in an open lot in a cross-fire of German machine guns and his platoon leader was killed. While two riflemen covered his movements from a building. Sergeant Bowman jumped through a window into the open lot and rushed the German machine-gun position on his right flank. Although wounded by enemy fire, he reached the enemy position and tossed grenades into the building, thus destroying the weapon and capturing the crew. This action allowed the remaining able men to resume the attack and to evacuate the wounded.

Corns of Engineers, United States Army, a member of the 8292d Service Unit, Hawaiian Engineer Depot, on 7 August 1949, displayed heroism at Sandy Beach, Oahu, Territory of Hawaii. Observing a man nearing the rocks, upon which a high surf was breaking, and struggling to escape the strong water currents, Private Gaylord, accompanied by Private Joseph F. Souza, plunged immediately into the water and swam through rough seas and high swells. After several attempts at rescue and after having been repeatedly torn away from the exhausted swimmer by high waves and raging surf, he managed to bring the man to shore. Private Gaylord's personal courage and quick action in an emergency, at the risk of his life, reflect great credit on himself and the military service.

Private First Class Joseph F. Souza (Army service No.). Chemical Corps, United States Army, a member of the 8310th Service Unit, Hawaiian Chemical Depot, Schofield Barracks, on 7 August 1949, displayed outstanding heroism at Sandy Beach, Oahu, Territory of Hawaii. Observing a man nearing the rocks, upon which a high surf was breaking, and struggling to escape the strong water currents, Private Souza, accompanied by Private William Gaylord, immediately plunged into the water and swam through rough seas and high swells, with utter disregard for his safety. After several attempts at rescue and after having been repeatedly torn away from the exhausted swimmer by high waves and raging surf, he managed to bring the man to shore. Private Souza's personal courage and quick action in an emergency, at the risk of his life, reflect great credit on himself and the military service.

First Lieutenant William S. McCutcheon, , Infantry, Army of the United States, a member of Company I, 411th Infantry Regiment, distinguished himself by heroic achievement in the vicinity of Rothbach, France, on 16 February 1945. When one of the members of his company was seriously wounded near the enemy lines, he organized and led a litter squad across fire-swept, rugged terrain and successfully evacuated the man. Lieutenant McOutcheon's courage and leadership are highly commendable.
