1..DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS.—By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 43, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action against an enemy is awarded posthumously to the following-named enlisted man:

Private First Class Reginald D. Smith (Service No.), Infantry, United States Army, a member of Company K, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in action near Onnamu-Go, Korea, on 8 October 1951. When his platoon came under withering cross-fire from strongly fortified positions, he moved boldly forward, hurled grenades into an enemy emplacement, and wiped out a machinegun crew, thereby enabling his unit to move forward. While nearing a second bunker, the valiant group was pinned down by intense enemy fire. Private Smith crept up the fire-swept hill, lobbed two grenades with deadly accuracy, and poured rifle fire into the position, killing all occupants. Although painfully wounded by a mortar burst, he continued forward until hostile fire reached such intensity that his unit was ordered to move back. He voluntarily remained in position, covering the retrograde movement. As he withdrew, he observed his platoon leader wounded and unable to move. He promptly administered first aid and began the slow, tortuous evacuation, crawling toward friendly lines. During this action, both men were mortally wounded by mortar fire. Private Smith's inspirational actions, gallant self-sacrifice, and consummate devotion to duty reflect the highest credit on himself and the military service.

II. DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE MEDAL.—By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 43, 1918), the Distinguished-Service Medal (first Oak-Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Lieutenant General Williston B. Palmer, United States Army. 5 December 1951 to 15 August 1952.

III. SILVER STAR.—By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 9 July 1918 (WD Bul. 43, 1918), the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the periods indicated is awarded to the following-named officers and enlisted man:

Major Jean Joseph Coppier, Air Force, French Army, distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious service and gallantry in France from January to November 1944. With utter disregard for his personal safety during military and clandestine operations against the enemy, he organized and operated an intelligence network in occupied territory. Through his indomitable energy and inspired leadership he succeeded in securing and transmitting valuable information which contributed greatly to the success of Allied operations against hostile forces. Major Coppier's initiative, courage, and devotion to duty reflect great credit on himself and the military service.

Corporal Theodore R. Hinterschied (Service No.) (then private), Infantry, United States Army, a member of Company C, 23d Infantry Regiment, 2d Infantry Division, distinguished himself by gallantry in action against an armed enemy of the United Nations near Pla-ri, Korea, on 15 and 16 September

After a bitter conflict, repulsing fanatical enemy attacks, his platoon was ordered to withdraw and Corporal Hinterschied covered the movement. throwing grenades and pouring fire into the ranks of the enemy and engaging in hand-to-hand combat before he rejoined his unit. Resupplied with ammunition, the platoon assumed the offensive and forced the enemy to withdraw. Corporal Hinterschied's courageous actions and calm demeanor bolstered morale, contributed significantly to the safe withdrawal of the platoon, and reflect great credit on himself and the military service.

, Republic of Korea Army, while serving Brigadier General Lee Chung Il, as Commanding General, 7th Republic of Korca Division, distinguished himself by gallantry in action against the enemy near Palmal, Korea, on 23 September 1951. When, during an assault on Hill 1142, the attacking elements of his division were halted, General Lee proceeded to the regimental observation post despite enemy mortar fire falling into the area. Upon his arrival, he personally took charge of the operation and remained with the forward elements with complete disregard for his safety. His enthusiasm and aggressive direction of the operation and his coolness under enemy fire, which caused heavy casualties in the immediate area, inspired his leaders to renew their efforts to accomplish their mission. The gallantry displayed by General Lee is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit on himself and the Republic of Korea Army.

Lieutenant Colonel Jaime Polania-Puyo, ., Colombian Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action near Kumsong, Korea, on 20 October 1951. As commanding officer of the Colombian Battalion attached to the 21st Infantry Regiment of the 24th United States Infantry Division, he established an observation post well forward in order to observe an assault which was being launched by his hattalion on a well-fortified enemy position. Having gained important information about the enemy and his runner having been wounded while attempting to return with the information to his command post, Colonel Polania-Puyo returned over the dangerous route and was seriously wounded while doing so, but refused to be evacuated until he had insured that proper measures had been taken to meet the obstacles confronting his battalion.

IV. LEGION OF MERIT.—By direction of the President, under the act of Congress approved 20 July 1942 (sec. III, WD Bul. 40, 1942) and Executive Order 9200, 29 October 1942 (sec. I, WD Bul. 54, 1942), the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service during the period indicated is awarded to the following-named officer:

Lieutenant Colonel Thomas B. Ross, , Infantry, United States Army, 15 June 1951 to 24 June 1952.

people of the United States.
