III..SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel Kenneth C. Crawford, , Judge Advocate General's Corps, United States Army, a member of the United States Army Infantry Center, Fort Benning, Ga., distinguished himself by heroism in the vicinity of the village of Indian Hill, Ohio, on 7 March 1959. While driving to a temporary duty station, Colonel Crawford observed an approaching automobile swerve off of the road in front of him, go down a steep embankment, strike a tree, and burst into flame. He immediately stopped his vehicle, dismounted and ran to the scene of the burning car and without regard for his own personal safety, broke a window in the automobile to gain entrance, freed the pinned and unconscious driver, and removed him, from the flaming automobile to a place of safety. Colonel Crawford returned immediately to the burning car in an effort to determine whether anyone else was in the vehicle. When the increasing intensity of the fire precluded entering the front portion of the car, he climbed upon the trunk of the automobile, broke out the rear window and so managed to assure himself that no one else was entrapped. Colonel Crawford's prompt, heroic actions, and determination undoubtedly saved the driver's life, and reflect distinct credit upon himself and the military service.
