I..LEGION OF MERIT. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit (Second Oak Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded posthumously to:

Major General *Carl F. Fritzsche*, United States Army. May 1953
to September 1960.

Brigadier General *Thomas H. Hayes*, United States Army. June
1955 to September 1960.

II..LEGION OF MERIT. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

Colonel *Walter P. Goodwin*, General Staff (Artillery), United
States Army. May to July 1960.

III..LEGION OF MERIT. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit (Degree of Commander) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

General *Adolf Heusinger*, Chief of Armed Forces Staff and Chairman of the
Inspector's Council of the Federal Republic of Germany. 1951 to
October 1960.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit (Degree of Officer) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

Brigadier General *Aurelio de Lyra Tavaras*, Brazilian Army. 1943 to August 1959.

3. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit (Degree of Legionnaire) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

Colonel *Luis Morcenes y Carvajal*, Artillery, Spanish Army. March 1957 to July 1960.

Colonel *Bernard Marie de Villemandy de la Mesniere*, Infantry, French Army. June 1958 to June 1960.

Captain *Francois J. M. X. Ardict*, National Navy of the Republic of France. July 1956 to May 1960.

IV..SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Captain *Charles T. Brown, Jr.* (then First Lieutenant), O4026461, Corps of Engineers, United States Army, a member of the 19th Aviation Detachment, United States Forces, distinguished himself by heroism at Montreuil Bellay, France, on 26 May 1960. When the Army helicopter on which he was Instructor-Pilot crashed and burst instantly into flames, Captain *Brown* managed to free himself from the burning wreckage. Without hesitation or concern for his own personal safety, and despite the fact that he was severely burned, he re-entered the blazing aircraft, and unstrapped and dragged the unconscious copilot to safety. Braving the intense heat again, in the face of an ever possible explosion, he crawled under the burning helicopter in an attempt to rescue the crew chief whom he believed was trapped inside. When the huge flames made it impossible for him to proceed and forced him to withdraw, his attention was attracted by screams from the crew chief who had been thrown free of the flaming aircraft on impact of the crash, and was aflame with gas and oil some 50 yards away. Using his body and bare hands, he quickly extinguished the flames on the blazing victim. The unselfish courage and heroic actions displayed by Captain *Brown* in saving the lives of his fellow soldiers in this sudden emergency are in the most cherished traditions of the United States Army, and reflect the utmost credit upon himself and the military service.

V..BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944, a Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States is awarded to:

Captain *Lynn A. Freeman*, (then First Lieutenant), Finance Corps, distinguished himself by heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an armed enemy during the period 6 to 31 August 1950. As Liaison Officer, Headquarters, 23d Infantry Regiment, 2d Infantry Division, Captain *Freeman's* outstanding bravery during a critical period under hazardous combat conditions advanced major tactical decisions for the effective operation of that organization in the Pusan Perimeter of Korea. His quick grasp of essential information, and his keen appreciation of regimental requirements for this intelligence provided guidance which resulted in the advanced planning necessary to accomplish vital military missions. His ability to evaluate the significance of events was thoroughly displayed, and was manifested by the accurate appraisals and recommendations which he made. His devotion to duty, as evidenced by his penetration at night of areas infiltrated by the enemy, provided

critical information of important operational, logistical, and administrative value. Captain Freeman's unselfish and courageous actions throughout this period are in the most cherished traditions of the United States Army, and reflect distinct credit upon himself and the military service.

VIII. ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL. 1. So much of section VI, General Orders Number 43, Department of the Army, 1950, as pertains to award of the Army Commendation Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) to Colonel *Walter W. McCarthy, Jr.*, Quartermaster Corps, United States Army, as reads "Army Commendation Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster)" is amended to read "Army Commendation Medal (Second Oak Leaf Cluster)."

2. So much of paragraph 1, section VII, General Orders Number 35, Department of the Army, 1960, as pertains to award of the Army Commendation Medal to Lieutenant Colonel *Willard P.
