I..DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, the Distinguished Service Medal for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility is awarded to:

Brigadier General *Andrew J. Goodpaster, Jr.*, O21739, United States Army. 1954 to 1961.

Major General *Harry W. Johnson*, , United States Army. July 1945 to January 1961.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, the Distinguished Service Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility is awarded to:

Lieutenant General *William H. Arnold*, , United States Army. May 1946 to January 1961.

Major General *Alvin L. Gorby*, , Medical Corps, United States Army. April 1951 to January 1961.

II..SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918, a Silver Star for gallantry in action is awarded to:

Captain *Frederick J. Foley, Jr.*, (then SFC,), Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action on or about 3 December 1950, in North Korea. As leader of the 3d Platoon, Company G, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3d Infantry Division, Captain *Foley* was in command of a unit which, while repelling an enemy attack from the top of a ridge in a defensive position, had sustained heavy casualties. Noticing that automatic enemy weapons fire had pinned down two members of his squad, and that one of the men was seriously wounded, Captain *Foley* advanced to the position of the trapped men and silenced the enemy weapons with a hand grenade. This unselfish and courageous action made it possible to evacuate the wounded man. Captain *Foley's* conspicuous heroism in risking his life to save that of his fellow soldier is in the most cherished tradition of the United States Army, and reflects distinct credit upon himself and the military service.

III..LEGION OF MERIT. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

Colonel *Robert A. Cliffe*, , Transportation Corps, United States Army. September 1950 to January 1961. (This award supersedes so much of General Orders No. 34, Department of the Army, dated 15 October 1958, as pertains to the previous award of the Army Commendation Medal to Colonel *Cliffe* for meritorious service during the period 1 July 1957 to 2 June 1958.)

Lieutenant Colonel *Oland B. Dunlap, Jr.*, , Artillery, United States Army. October 1956 to January 1961.

Lieutenant Colonel *John S. D. Eisenhower*, , Infantry, United States Army. October 1958 to January 1961.

Colonel *Robert L. Schulz*, , Transportation Corps, United States Army. For more than sixteen years, continuously member of his staff or Military Aide to Dwight D. Eisenhower as Chief of Staff of the

United States Army, President of Columbia University, Supreme Commander Allied Powers Europe, and President of the United States.
Colonel *George R. Stephens*, , United States Army. October 1945 to January 1961.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit (First Oak Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

Colonel *Charles O. Case, Jr.*, , Quartermaster Corps, United States Army. August 1958 to November 1960.

Colonel *Walter Krueger, Jr.*, , General Staff (Corps of Engineers), United States Army. May 1958 to January 1961.

3. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 20 July 1942, and Executive Order 10600, 15 March 1955, the Legion of Merit (Second Oak Leaf Cluster) for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding service is awarded to:

Major General *Charles D. W. Canham*, , United States Army. July 1954 to January 1961.

Brigadier General *Peter Schmick*, , United States Army. July 1951 to January 1961.

IV..SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Sergeant *John B. Sargent*, , Artillery, United States Army, a member of Battery A, 3d Missile Battalion (NIKE-HERCULES), 57th Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism in the City of Stanton, California, on 20 September 1960. A civilian tree serviceman working some 25 feet above the ground came in contact with a high voltage power line and was floundering in a semi-conscious state in a hydraulic bucket directly under the hot wire. The bucket controls had jammed and were inoperable from the ground, leaving the man in constant danger of touching the hot line again and being electrocuted. Immediately noticing this hazardous situation, and fully aware of the danger involved, Sergeant *Sargent* voluntarily engaged in an attempt to rescue the victim. Realizing that the many quickly gathering people might complicate the rescue and result in additional casualties, Sergeant *Sargent* restrained the crowd and, without hesitation or concern for his own personal safety, climbed the tree to the stricken man. Working under circumstances wherein the slightest miscalculation could have brought certain and sudden death, he remained in the vicinity of the highly charged wire and assisted in extricating the man from under the wires. After the man was safely lowered to the ground, Sergeant *Sargent* promptly administered artificial respiration and first aid to treat the victim for shock. His unselfish courage and outstanding heroism in this sudden emergency are in the most cherished traditions of the United States Army, reflect distinct credit upon himself and the military service.

V..BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944, a Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States is awarded to:

Captain *Harry A. Dunbrack*, (then Second Lieutenant), Armor, United States Army. July 1950 to May 1951.

VI..BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944, a Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States is awarded to:

Captain *Paul A. Stough*, (then First Lieutenant), Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism in ground combat against an armed enemy in the vicinity of Hyongpung, Korea, on 31 August 1950. Captain *Stough* was Executive Officer of Company "C", 38th Infantry, 2d Infantry Division, when the company sustained an extended artillery and mortar barrage, and was again subjected to a fierce night attack by numerically superior enemy forces. Upon finding that communication was lost with the company commander,

and that the company perimeter was breached, Captain *Stough*, on his own volition, quickly organized the company command group as a fighting force and led them in an attack against the enemy in the most critical area. His courageous actions were instrumental in restoring penetrated positions and in repelling enemy attempts to cross the Nakdong River. His bold leadership contributed materially to the defense of the company position, and resulted in the infliction of numerous casualties upon the enemy. The outstanding heroism displayed by Captain *Stough* is in the most cherished tradition of the United States Army, and reflects distinct credit upon himself and the military service.
