IV\_DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, 2 July 1926, a Distinguished Flying Cross for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded to:

Chief Warrant Officer Thomas P. Lundgren, W3150442, Transportation Corps, United States Army, a member of the 15th Transportation Detachment, 1st Cavalry Division, distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight on 26 February 1962, in Korea. Warrant Officer Lundgren was the pilot of an H-19C Chickasaw helicopter carrying a co-pilot and five passengers. In an attempt to land the helicopter at a helipad in mountainous terrain, the anti-torque mechanism suddenly failed and the aircraft began to vibrate violently at approximately one hundred feet above the ground. As the helicopter settled earthward, directional control was lost and the aircraft started to turn away from the helipad into a wooded area. In this sudden emergency, Warrant Officer Lundgren demonstrated outstanding technical competence, sound judgment, and presence of mind. Despite the extreme difficulty in maintaining control of the helicopter, he succeeded in maneuvering its tailboom against a tree, thereby stabilizing the aircraft, and preventing it from completely spinning out of control. After assuring that his passengers were evacuated and a safe distance away, he then attempted to save the helicopter by hover-taxiing it

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to the helipad. When the tailboom became dislodged from the tree, the helicopter rotated violently, became completely uncontrollable, crashed, and immediately burst into flames. When the aircraft crashed, the co-pilot was trapped on the flight deck. Warrant Officer Lundgren assisted him to safety through the pilot's emergency exit, then evacuated himself before the burning aircraft became completely engulfed by flames. Warrant Officer Lundgren's complete disregard for his own personal safety, quick thinking, and courageous action saved the lives of his passengers and co-pilot and reflects the utmost credit on himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the previous award of the Army Commendation Medal for meritorious achievement on 26 February 1962, as announced in General Orders Number 46, dated 2 April 1962, Headquarters 1st Cavalry Division, APO 24, San Francisco, California.)

Captain James R. Sulpizi, O2270241, Artillery, United States Army, an Army Aviator assigned with Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Delaware Army National Guard, Wilmington, Delaware, distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight on 7 March 1962, at Indian River, Delaware. During a disastrous storm and flood that struck the Delaware coast, Captain Sulpizi unhesitatingly volunteered to fly the only available aircraft, a one-passenger H-13 helicopter, to rescue personnel in danger of drowning from rising flood waters at the Indian River Coast Guard Station. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, and by skillfully piloting his aircraft through violent atmospheric turbulence that normally would preclude all flight operations, he courageously made ten round-trip rescue missions of approximately nine miles each way. Although gale force winds rendered the operation of the small helicopter extremely hazardous, he successfully rescued five persons from the Coast Guard Station. By continuing in his efforts, he evacuated five other victims who were clinging to trucks awash in the treacherous flood waters. His singlehanded dangerous rescue missions continued over a period of several hours and ended only after a larger helicopter arrived to evacuate the remaining flood victims. Captain Sulpizi's strong determination, presence of mind, and heroic action in this emergency that saved the lives of ten persons, reflect great credit on himself and the military service.

While fishing from the bank of Kings Pond, Sergeant Thomas noticed that

two small children were the only occupants of a station wagon rolling toward the lake. Unhesitatingly, and without concern for his own personal safety, he rushed to their rescue. He made a spontaneous attempt to halt the moving vehicle with his shoulders, swung himself around to the left door, and slowed the momentum of the car as it plunged into the lake. After rescuing one child from the sinking car, he quickly returned to aid another soldier in the rescue of the second child before the vehicle became completely submerged in the lake. Sergeant *Thomas*' exemplary conduct, quick thinking, and courageous action in this emergency reflect the utmost credit on himself and the military service.
