V_SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Platoon Sergeant Roger D. Anderson, Application, (then Sergeant First Class), United States Army, a member of the 2d Platoon, Company A, 1st

Battle Group, 8th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division, distinguished himself by heroism on 4 May 1962, in Korea. While working as a member of a minefield detail, a Korean soldier of the Korean Augmentation to the United States Army, accidentally stepped into a minefield cluster, exploded one of the mines which severed his leg, and caused him to fall within other live mines in the cluster. Upon hearing the explosion, Sergeant Anderson rushed to the area, and, fully aware of the extreme danger to his own life, voluntarily and promptly participated in the hazardous rescue operation. After probing, locating, and disarming the mines in the area and reaching the severely wounded Korean, he quickly applied first aid and discovered that the injured soldier was lying on top of a live mine. Realizing the imminent danger of detonation in attempting to remove the mine from beneath the victim, he undauntedly started the harrowing and dangerous task. He held the wounded man's body with one hand to prevent him from moving and exploding the mine and fearlessly and skillfully extracted the mine and continued his work until all mines in the cluster were located and disarmed. He then capably assisted in evacuating the wounded soldier from the minefield. Sergeant Anderson's unhesitating, efficient, and heroic action in the face of grave danger saved the life of his Korean comrade and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes so much of General Order Number 75, Headquarters 1st Cavalry Division, dated 4 June 1962, as pertains to award of the Army Commendation Medal to Sergeant Anderson for meritorious achievement on 4 May 1962.)

Specialist Four Winston H. Barber, Latenth Detachment, 35th Artillery Brigade Air Defense, Hampton Roads Element, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 7 March 1962, at Nags Head, North Carolina. Specialist Barber and the other members of the detachment were forced to evacuate the radar site when a treacherous storm, characterized by raging flood waters and high tidal waves, threatened to destroy the main buildings. Realizing that many classified documents were stored at the site, Specialist Barber volunteered to return to the site to salvage them. Without concern for his own personal safety or life, he traveled a round trip of over two miles through the hazardous rampaging flood waters with waves up to 15 feet and salvaged approximately seventy-five pounds of material. Specialist Barber's heroic action in the face of extreme danger is worthy of emulation and reflects great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Master Sergeant John E. Cordell, Armor, United States Army, while a member of Company B, 2d Medium Tank Battalion, 32d Armor, distinguished himself by heroism on 23 June 1961 at Ayers Kaserne, Kirchgoens, Germany. While his unit was performing scheduled maintenance in the Battalion tank park, a high velocity armor piercing round exploded in the ready rack of an M-48A1 Main Battle Tank and started a serious fire in the fighting compartment. Although an explosion in the tank which was loaded with ammunition and fuel appeared imminent, Sergeant Cordell unhesitatingly and immediately climbed on the right sponson boxes of the tank and fought the fire with portable fire extinguishers. He directed other members of the command to bring additional extinguishers, and continued to fight the fire from the loader's hatch until it was extinguished. Sergeant Cordell's complete disregard for his own safety and courageous action in this emergency reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Sergeant First Class George S. Salema, Armor, United States Army, a member of Company B, 2d Medium Tank Battalion, 32d Armor, distinguished himself by heroism on 23 June 1961 at Ayers Kaserne, Kirchgoens, Germany. While his unit was performing scheduled maintenance in the Battalion tank park, a high velocity armor piercing round exploded in the ready rack of an M-48A1 Main Battle Tank and started a serious fire in the fighting compartment. Although an explosion in the tank which was loaded with ammunition and fuel appeared imminent, Sergeant Salema unhesitatingly and immediately climbed on the left sponson boxes of the tank and closed the tank commander's hatch. When other members of the command brought portable fire extinguishers to the burning tank, he opened the hatch, fought the fire from the tank commander's hatch, and after expending several extinguishers, entered the fighting compartment which was still burning and continued to fight the fire until it was extinguished. Sergeant Salema's complete disregard for his own safety and courageous action in this emergency reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Specialist Four Robert J. Wahle, member of the 2148th United States Army Garrison, Louisville, Kentucky, distinguished himself by heroism on 7 July 1962 while en route by bus to Camp Breckinridge, Kentucky for annual active training duty. While members of the unit were loading their baggage, the shouts of the bus driver drew sudden attention to a small child on the railroad track near the highway and to a freight train approaching at full speed 500 feet away. With complete disregard for his own life, Specialist Wahle ran 30 feet, raced up the railroad embankment, and with a flying tackle, grabbed the child, rolled off the tracks, and the two of them tumbled down the opposite embankment at the instant the train reached the spot where the child was standing. Specialist Wahle's courageous actions in this emergency are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.
