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I_DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved, 9 July 1918, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action against an enemy is awarded to:

Captain Moir E. Eanes, O2203088 (then Second Lieutenant), Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy on 2 June 1951, near Chipo-ri, Korea. Captain Eanes dauntlessly led the 3d Platoon, Company C, 24th Infantry Regiment in an attack on the left flank of the Company's objective, Hill 543. After the platoon worked its way up the forward slopes of the hill, it came upon stubborn enemy resistance comprised of numerous well concealed automatic weapons emplaced in the rocky crags. Although several of the men of the platoon were wounded in the initial attack, Captain Eanes quickly rallied the men and renewed the assault. As spearhead of the assault, he personally eliminated two enemy bunkers and led his platoon toward the crest of the hill. Upon reaching the top of the crest, he was wounded by an enemy grenade. Despite his wounds, he refused evacuation, consolidated the gains, and led his men to the final objective. A rain of grenades and hail of enemy bullets again deterred their progress, and although Captain Eanes was seriously wounded, he did not accept evacuation until the platoon was turned over to the platoon sergeant. Captain Eanes' conspicuous gallantry, forceful leadership, and dedicated devotion to duty reflect the highest credit upon himself and the military service.

VI_SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Private First Class Tyrone M. Barr, Artillery, United States Army, a member of Battery B, 5th Howitzer Battalion, 92d Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism on 13 April 1962, at the Seventh Army Training Area, Grafenwohr, Germany. During a calibration firing exercise, a round of ammunition exploded in a self-propelled M-52 Howitzer. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, Private Barr unhesitatingly rushed past flying metal fragments to rescue members of the gun crew still inside the vehicle

which was loaded with rounds of ammunition and enveloped in billowing clouds of dense smoke. Private Barr quickly arrived at the weapon, and with the assistance of one of the Battery officers, succeeded in removing an injured crew member from the turret. Private Barr's heroism and deep concern for his fellow soldiers are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army, and reflect the utmost credit upon himself and the military service.

Private First Class Jerry Allen Black, , Artillery, United States Army, a member of the Firing Battery, 2d Missile Battalion (COR-PORAL), 81st Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism on 23 August 1962, in the vicinity of Eltersdorf, Germany. While en route to a field position on a weekly training exercise, Private Black was the assistant operator of an M-2 Erector, the vehicle which was transporting a CORPORAL missile. Suddenly, the vehicle suffered mechanical failure, veered off an Autobahn overpass, plunged through guardrails, and rolled down a 20-foot embankment. In the havog of the crash, the individual cabs of the driver and the assistant driver were crushed, a tremendous amount of gasoline was spilled, and the engine burst into flames. Although Private Black sustained a painful hand injury, he extricated himself from the wreckage, and then, unhesitatingly, evacuated his injured comrade from the burning vehicle. With full knowledge of an impending gasoline explosion and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, he swiftly returned to the blazing wreckage and fought the fire with hand fire extinguishers. Through his effectiveness in helping to control the blaze until members of the convoy rendered relief, costly equipment, which was essential to the successful operation of a CORPORAL battalion, was salvaged. Private Black's initiative, courageous action, and deep regard for life and property are in the finest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain George B. Calhoun, , Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 16 July 1962, in Kontum Province, Vietnam. When a Vietnamese Air Force Troop Transport crashed, Captain Calhoun unhesitatingly volunteered to assist in saving the lives of the crew and passengers. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, he dashed into the wreckage, faced the possibility of detonation of explosives scattered around the area, and with a fire extinguisher, put out the fires as they started. When the extinguisher became exhausted, he assisted in removing the injured and continued the search for survivors until flames drove him back from the wreckage. Upon the arrival of fresh fire extinguishers, he repeatedly reentered the danger area, continued to fight fires, and was of invaluable assistance by giving clear and concise orders to the volunteer rescue teams and fire fighting crews. Captain Calhoun's courage and exemplary actions saved the lives of four Vietnamese soldiers and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain Gene A. Mitchell, , Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism while serving as Ranger Advisor to the 31st Division Tactical Zone during the conduct of Ranger Training for the Army of the Republic of Vietnam in Phuoc Long Province, Republic of Vietnam, on 25 June 1962. During swimming training exercises across a swift flowing waterfall, Captain Mitchell observed a Vietnamese soldier floundering and heard calls for help. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, he unhesitatingly dove into the river, swam to the drowning man, and succeeded in pulling him to the shore. He then administered first aid to the soldier to

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revive him sufficiently to be evacuated to the province hospital. Captain *Mitchell's* prompt and heroic action is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain George C. Wallace, Artillery, United States Army, Battery C (Provisional), 5th Howitzer Battalion, 92d Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism on 13 April 1962, at the Seventh Army Training Area, Grafenwohr, Germany. While Captain Wallace was directing a calibration firing exercise, a round of ammunition exploded in a self-propelled, M-52 Howitzer. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, he unhesitatingly rushed past flying metal fragments to rescue members of the gun crew still inside the vehicle which was loaded with rounds of ammunition and enveloped in billowing clouds of dense smoke. He quickly arrived at the weapon, and with the assistance of a soldier, succeeded in removing an injured crew member from the turret. Captain Wallace's heroism and deep concern for his fellow soldiers are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army, and reflect the utmost credit upon himself and the military service.
