First Lieutenant Bruce L. Marsh, Grdnance Corps, United States Army, 542d Ordnance Detachment, First United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 16 December 1962, at Fort Jay, Governors Island, New York. While in the vicinity of the dock area, Lieutenant Marsh observed an automobile, apparently out of control, move across the ferry dock and plunge into the water. He immediately rushed to the scene and attempted a rescue by throwing a life preserver to the victim who had crawled out of the car and was clinging to the slowly sinking and drifting vehicle. Because of the distance of approximately 60 feet, Lieutenant Marsh was unsuccessful in this effort. He quickly stripped off his clothing, and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, dove into the icy and treacherous currents, swam to the life preserver, pushed it to the stricken individual, helped him to grasp it, and towed him to the dock where they were both assisted to safety. Lieutenant Marsh's prompt and heroic action is in the highest tradition of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.
