## HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY WASHINGTON, D.C., 28 February 1964

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I\_GENERAL COURTS-MARTIAL. The Commanding Officer, 32d Artillery Brigade, is designated by the Secretary of the Army, pursuant to the Uniform Code of Military Justice, Article 22(a)(6), to convene general courts-martial, effective 1 March 1964.

II\_OFFICE OF THE CHIEF SIGNAL OFFICER. Effective 1 March 1964, the Office of the Chief Signal Officer is redesignated the Office of the Chief of Communications-Electronics (OCC-E).

## III\_U.S. ARMY STRATEGIC COMMUNICATIONS COMMAND, WASHINGTON, D.C.

- 1. Effective 1 March 1964, the U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command, Washington, D.C., a class II activity under command of the Chief Signal Officer, is discontinued as a class II activity and established as a major field command of the Department of the Army.
- 2. The Commanding General, U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command, is the single operating and coordinating authority for—
- a. The direction and control of those Army telecommunications elements which operate strategic radio, wire, and cable facilities, including those supporting the Defense Communications System.
- b. The central point of contact within the Army for the coordination and resolution of communi-

cations operational problems with the Director, Defense Communications Agency.

IV. RESPONSIBILITY FOR CIVILIAN PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT IN THE ARMY ESTABLISHMENT. Paragraph 3, General Orders 32, 1956, is amended by adding subparagraph m as follows:

m. The Commanding General, U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command, for the activities under his command.

V\_STRATEGIC COMMUNICATIONS ACTIVITIES. Effective 1 March 1964, the following class II activities under command of the Chief Signal Officer are transferred to the command of the Commanding General, U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command:

Joint Communication Agency.

U.S. Army Interagency Communications Agency.

U.S. Army Signal Radio Propagation Agency.

Fort Ritchie, Maryland.

Winchester, Virginia.

Fort Monmouth, New Jersey.

VI.\_U.S. ARMY SIGNAL COMMUNICA-TIONS SECURITY AGENCY. Effective 1 March 1964, the U.S. Army Signal Communications Security Agency, Arlington Hall Station, Arlington, Virginia, a class II activity under command of the Chief Signal Officer, is discontinued. Effective the same date, the mission, personnel, manpower spaces, funds, and property of this agency will be consolidated with the mission activities of the U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command, Washington, D.C., a major field command of the Department of the Army.

VII\_U.S. ARMY CONUS REGIONAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMAND. Effective 1 March 1964, the U.S. Army CONUS Regional Communications Command, Washington, D.C., an activity of the U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command, is redesignated the U.S. Army Strategic Communications Command—CONUS.

VIII\_NATIONAL BOARD FOR THE PRO-MOTION OF RIFLE PRACTICE. Paragraph 1, General Orders 54, 1962, is amended as follows:

- 1. Effective 16 February 1964, the Honorable Edmund T. Pratt, Jr., Assistant Secretary of the Army (Financial Management), is announced as president of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, vice the Honorable Stephen Ailes.
- 2. Effective 1 March 1964, Brigadier General Roland B. Anderson, USA, is announced as a member of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, representing the U.S. Army Materiel Command (Weapons Command), vice Major General Nelson M. Lynde, Jr., USA, Retired.

IX\_HEADQUARTERS, U.S. ARMY TRANSPORTATION TERMINAL COM-MAND, ARCTIC. Effective 28 March 1964, the Headquarters, U.S. Army Transportation Termi-

nal Command, Arctic (TD TC-7413-OF), a class II special foreign activity under the jurisdiction of the Chief of Transportation and located at Stewart Air Force Base, New York, is discontinued.

- X\_U.S. ARMY OVERSEA SUPPLY AGENCIES. Effective 1 July 1964, the following class II activities under the jurisdiction of the Commanding General, U.S. Army Materiel Command, are discontinued.

- b. U.S. Army Oversea Supply Agency, New Orleans, New Orleans, Louisiana.
- c. U.S. Army Oversea Supply Agency, San Francisco, Fort Mason, California.

XI. U.S. ARMY MATERIEL COMMAND ACTIVITIES. Effective 1 February 1964, the following class II activities under the jurisdiction of the Commanding General, U.S. Army Materiel Command, are redesignated as indicated:
