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I. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, the Distinguished Service Medal for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility is awarded posthumously to:

Lieutenant Colonel *John D. Lawson*, , Medical Corps, United States Army. June 1949 to July 1963. (This award supersedes awards of the Army Commendation Medal for meritorious service from 23 August 1953 to 1 July 1954, as announced in General Orders Number 524, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, APO 301, c/o Postmaster, San Francisco, Calif., dated 14 August 1954 and the Army Commendation Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) for meritorious service from 15 April 1959 to 2 January 1962, as announced in General Orders Number 4, Headquarters, United States Army Aviation Center, Fort Rucker, Ala., dated 31 January 1962.)

II. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 9 July 1918, the Distinguished Service Medal for exceptionally meritorious and distinguished service in a position of great responsibility is awarded to:

III. SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918, a Silver Star for gallantry in action is awarded to:

Captain *George M. Buck*, , Army Intelligence and Security, United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 24 February 1964. While serving as an Advisor and accompanying a reconnaissance company on a mission in support of operations in the Republic of Vietnam, Captain *Buck* heard an explosion followed by the sound of rifle and small arms fire approximately 6 kilometers from his location. He immediately advised his counterpart to send the unit to the ambush site and, upon arrival, it was discovered that the Vietnamese ele-

ments were engaged in battle with the hostile forces that had blown up one of the supply trucks in a convoy of the friendly forces. During the engagement, Captain *Buck* bravely exposed himself to heavy small arms fire while assuming a forward position to advise and encourage the Vietnamese forces to pursue their objective. As the battle progressed and the hostile forces were repelled considerably, Captain *Buck* spotted one of the enemy attempting an escape by advancing through the friendly lines. Then, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, he fearlessly ignored the fire fight all around him and tackled the enemy soldier, taking him alive for interrogation. By his courageous example, sound advice, and professional skill, he inspired his Vietnamese counterparts to pursue their efforts in the defense of their homeland. Captain *Buck's* conspicuous gallantry is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain *John E. Eshelman*, Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on the 19th and 20th of October 1963. While participating in a military operation an advisor to a Vietnamese battalion, Captain *Eshelman* accompanied the first airlift of a large force into a heliborne landing zone. After an advance of 200 meters, the unit came under intense automatic weapons, mortar, and small arms fire from hostile forces entrenched in prepared and concealed positions. In the hail of gunfire which followed the initial onslaught that wounded and killed many of the friendly forces, he unhesitatingly and bravely moved over the open terrain from position to position to encourage the Vietnamese commander and the troops to pursue their efforts. Despite personal wounds in the hand and chest, Captain *Eshelman* continued to provide assistance and professional advice throughout the entire morning, inspiring the greatly depleted force to follow his example and to take their objective. When another American advisor with reinforcements appeared on the scene, he refused evacuation, remained with the unit under continuous gunfire throughout the day and night, and continued his valiant efforts until the hostile action diminished on the following morning before he accepted evacuation for treatment of his wounds. Captain *Eshelman's* conspicuous gallantry and unselfish actions are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Private First Class *Robert A. Graupman*, United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 30 August 1963. As a crewmember on board a CH-21 Helicopter, Private *Graupman* was participating in a mission to support the ground forces of the Army of the Republic of Vietnam when another United States Army helicopter crashed in the midst of extremely heavy hostile gunfire. As soon as his pilot landed the helicopter in the combat zone to assist in the evacuation of the crewmembers and equipment of the downed aircraft, Private *Graupman* swiftly left the aircraft, ran through the intense gunfire, and assisted in evacuating an injured crew member. He then continued to display his fortitude and complete disregard for his own personal safety by returning to the wreckage to assist in carrying a second injured man away from the flanking gunfire. Throughout the remainder of the hazardous operation, he covered his fellow soldiers with his personal weapon until the rescue mission was completed. Private *Graupman's* unselfish actions and conspicuous gallantry in this dangerous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Specialist four *Norman H. Guthrie*, , United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 30 August 1963. As Crew Chief on board a CH-21 Helicopter, Specialist *Guthrie* was participating in a mission to support the ground forces of the Army of the Republic of Vietnam when another United States Army helicopter crashed in the midst of extremely heavy hostile gunfire. As soon as his pilot landed the helicopter in the combat zone to assist in the evacuation of the crewmembers and equipment of the downed aircraft, Specialist *Guthrie* swiftly left the aircraft, ran through the intense gunfire, and assisted in evacuating an injured crewmember. He then continued to display his fortitude and complete disregard for his own personal safety by returning to the wreckage to assist in carrying a second injured man away from the flanking gunfire. After the injured personnel were on board his helicopter, he ignored the bullets passing through the aircraft and administered first aid to the wounded until relieved by a doctor at a medical aid station. Specialist *Guthrie's* unselfish actions and conspicuous gallantry in this hazardous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

First Lieutenant *Hershell B. Murray*, , Artillery, United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 8 March 1964. Lieutenant *Murray* was serving as Assistant Battalion Advisor to a ranger battalion of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam when the unit suddenly came under attack from hostile forces and suffered heavy casualties. Lieutenant *Murray* then displayed fortitude, professional skill, and complete disregard for his own personal safety by exposing himself to sniper fire while assisting in the construction of a helicopter pad for the evacuation of the wounded. To bring the helicopter into the small landing area, he exposed himself to the increasing gunfire and sustained a bullet wound. Despite his personal injury, he continued his courageous efforts during the second helicopter evacuation and talked on the radio to guide the pilots away from the strong points of the hostile forces. Lieutenant *Murray's* conspicuous gallantry is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Sergeant First Class *Ralph Rhoden*, , United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 8 March 1964. Sergeant *Rhoden* was serving as an Advisor to a ranger battalion of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam when the unit suddenly came under attack from hostile forces and suffered heavy casualties. During the ensuing engagement, Sergeant *Rhoden* displayed fortitude, professional skill, and complete disregard for his own personal safety by exposing himself to the small arms and automatic weapons as he advised the rangers in the employment of their weapons. He then assisted in moving to a relatively safe area where preparations were made for a helicopter evacuation landing site, and although the hostile forces soon located the working party, the construction continued despite the intense sniper fire. While waiting for the helicopter, he courageously stood apart from the wounded to draw the enemy fire toward himself, and when the helicopter arrived, he continued to expose himself to the gunfire to help load the wounded. During the second evacuation operation, he completely ignored the hail of bullets striking close to his body as he guided the helicopter to the landing pad. Sergeant *Rhoden's* conspicuous

gallantry is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain *William J. Thompson*, , Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 25 April 1964. As a Senior Advisor to a battalion of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam, Captain *Thompson* displayed fortitude, professional skill, and perseverance during a military operation. When the lead elements of the battalion were subjected to hostile small arms fire, he voluntarily proceeded to the forward position where four armored scout carriers were halted, and attempted to reorganize the dispersed Vietnamese units with the mission of retrieving their equipment, dead, and wounded. Through his courageous personal example, he succeeded in rallying the components and in encouraging them to move forward again. Then, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, he led this force forward over open terrain while exposed to the gunfire of the hostile forces well entrenched in rocky and heavily wooded positions on hills which dominated the field of battle. Despite the constant enemy fire, he continued his brave efforts by directing the operations of the friendly units and by assisting them in evacuating their wounded and dead which led to the successful completion of the mission. Captain *Thompson's* conspicuous gallantry is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

VIII. BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded posthumously to:

Corporal *George F. Larion, Jr.*, , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic achievement while engaged in military operations against an opposing armed force on 30 July 1963, in the vicinity of Notheri Korea. Upon learning that an armed North Korean patrol had been sighted in the area of Notheri, Corporal *Larion* unhesitatingly volunteered to participate in a military operation to drive out the hostile forces. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, he joined the skirmish line and, while displaying coolness and fortitude, participated in the effort to locate the insurgents until he was mortally wounded by hostile gunfire. His courage, professional competence, and dedicated devotion to duty served to detect the position of the hostile forces and contributed materially to the successful accomplishment of the mission. Corporal *Larion's* courageous actions and out-

standing performance of duty in this hazardous situation reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal (Posthumous) to Corporal *Larion* for meritorious service on 30 July 1963 as announced in General Orders Number 144, Headquarters 7th Infantry Division, dated 30 October 1963.)

IX--BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal with "V" device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded to:

Sergeant *Abraham W. McManus*, , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic achievement while engaged in military operations against an opposing armed force on 30 July 1963, in the vicinity of Nodri, Korea. Upon learning that an armed North Korean patrol had been sighted in the area of Nodri, Sergeant *McManus* unhesitatingly volunteered to join a skirmish line to drive out the hostile forces. When a fellow soldier close to him was suddenly felled by hostile gunfire during the advance, he displayed coolness and fortitude, made his way toward the direction of the gunfire, and detected the position of the hostile forces. Noticing that one was preparing a grenade and another attempting to load an automatic weapon, Sergeant *McManus* demonstrated complete disregard for his own personal safety by jumping to his feet and preventing the hostile action from materializing. His courage, professional competence, and dedicated devotion to duty served to avert further casualties to his unit and contributed in great measure to the successful accomplishment of the mission. Sergeant *McManus'* heroic actions and outstanding performance of duty in this hazardous situation reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Sergeant *McManus* for heroism on 30 July 1964 as announced in General Orders Number 232, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, dated 27 December 1963.)
