Sergeant James L. Talley, , United States Army, distinguished himself by gallantry in action while engaged in military operations in Vietnam on 19 June 1964. As an Advisor, Sergeant Talley was accompanying a Vietnamese combat patrol on a search and clear operation when the frendly element engaged a strong hostile force which was defending a heavily fortified position. During the ensuing battle, he bravely placed himself in the lead position to advise his Vietnamese counterparts, and then maneuvered to an extremely dangerous position to provide cover for the Detachment Commander who was armed with a grenade launcher against the onrushing enemy. Throughout three vicious enemy assaults, Sergeant Talley displayed fearless determination while exposed to a barrage of weapons fire, and continued to engage the enemy with outstanding effectiveness despite the overwhelming onslaught. Sergeant Talley's fortitude, courageous actions, and conspicuous gallantry are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

III....SIVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918, a Silver Star for gallantry in action is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel Douglas K. McKnight, , United States Air Force, (then First Lieutenant, O769165, United States Army Air Corps), distinguished himself by gallantry in action against an armed enemy on 21 November 1944, in Germany. As a Bombardier, serving with the 306th Bomb Group, 423d Bomb Squadron, Colonel McKnight demonstrated fortitude, professional skill, and complete disregard for his own safety while engaged in a combat mission. When the aircraft crew took off from Mertzberg, Germany and was unable to proceed to the target, a secondary target was chosen. As the aircraft turned toward the initial point, two bursts of flak disabled the outboard engines and set them on fire. While falling back from the formation, the aircraft was attacked by enemy fighters and the navigator was seriously wounded. Simultaneously, the other two engines went out. Although the pilot succeeded in keeping the plane airborne until the crew had jumped, Colonel McKnight refused to bail out until he

administered first aid to the wounded navigator, affixed a parachute to him, and pushed him out of the disabled aircraft. Although Colonel McKnight and the crew became prisoners of war for five months and separated, it was learned at a later date that the wounded navigator had been taken to a hospital and recovered. Colonel McKnight's conspicuous gallantry and deep concern for his fellow soldier are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

, Armor, United States Army, as Major Charles W. Mooney. a member of the 2d Aviation Detachment, United States Military Academy, West Point, New York, distinguished himself by heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight on 18 May 1964 at Storm King Mountain, near Cornwall, New York, As pilot of an Army UH-1A helicopter, Major Mooney demonstrated fortitude and professional skill in the performance of a hazardous rescue mission. He unhesitatingly volunteered to fly the aircraft at midnight into a dark, unfamiliar, mountainous area to evacuate a severely injured civilian from atop a rugged mountain peak. Although aided only by the light of ground flares and an aircraft search light, he landed the helicopter in an area so restricted that the tail of the aircraft projected over a cliff 1200 feet above the Hudson River. His success in landing the front of the landing skids against the precipitous slope and in holding the aircraft with engine power enabled the crew to reach the victim and load him aboard the helicopter. He then continued to display his determination, professional competence, and profound concern for his fellow man by flying the injured man to the nearest hospital and landing the hlicopter on the front lawn of the hospital. His courage and successful effort in saving a human life significantly enhanced the good will existing between the military establishment and the local community. Major Mooney's heroic conduct, outstanding flying ability, and humanitarian actions during this dangerous mission are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain James G. Bland, Medical Corps, as a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 13th Infantry, distinguished himself by heroism on 27 July 1964, near Michelstadt, Germany. When informed that urgent assistance was needed at the scene of an accident in which an Army truck, carrying sixteen tons of 155mm ammunition, had turned over, started to burn, and pinned the driver beneath the wreckage, Captain Bland unhesitatingly volunteered to participate in the rescue effort. As he and the rescue party arrived in a vehicle (Tracked Recovery) at the accident site in a wooded area, the exploding 155mm shells had started a number of brush fires and one serious fire threatened 40,000 acres of prime coniferous forest. With complete disregard for his own safety and ignoring the exploding shells and fire, he rode to the area of the wreckage where exploding shells prevented the evacuation of the truck driver. When the hazardous situation required that the rescue vehicle be moved to safe location, he dismounted and crawled through brush fires to reach the truck. Two minutes after the medics determined that the driver was no longer alive and the rescue party had moved to a safe area, a tremendous explosion occurred hurling blazing fragments into the air and starting new fires. Throughout the dangerous rescue mission, he demonstrated fortitude, perseverance, and deep concern for the life of a fellow soldier. Captain *Bland's* heroic conduct is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

, United States Army, Specialist Four John W. Fisher, as a member of the 36th Ordnance Detachment (Explosive Disposal), distinguished himself by heroism on 8 June 1964, at Corozal, Canal Zone. Upon hearing an explosion in the unit workshop where a fellow soldier had been examining a home-made bomb, Specialist Fisher rushed to the scene. With complete disregard for his own safety and ignoring a possibility of a second explosion and toxic gasses, he worked his way through dense smoke and discovered that his fellow soldier was critically wounded. Then, with the assistance of another rescue volunteer, he rapidly and efficiently administered first aid to the injured man. When the seriousness of the wounded man's condition precluded removing him from the spot, Specialist Fisher remained with him in the hazardous environment, aiding him physically and spiritually until an ambulance arrived. Specialist Fisher's heroic conduct and deep concern for the welfare of a fellow soldier are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Specialist Four Fisher for meritorious achievement on 8 June 1964 as announced in General Orders Number 134, Headquarters, United States Army Forces Southern Command, dated 24 December 1964.)

Specialist Four Arthur N. McCallen, , United States Army, as a member of Battery C, 1st Missile Battalion (Hercules), 254th Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism on 27 September 1964, in South Plainfield, New Jersey. It was dawn when Specialist McCallen and a fellow soldier noticed that a house adjacent to the military installation was on fire. He ran to the scene of the fire and, with complete disregard for his own safety, entered the burning dwelling, woke up a woman, and assisted in leading her through the dense smoke to safety. Specialist McCallen's prompt action and heroic conduct in this emergency are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Staff Sergeant Ralph W. Miller, , United States Army, as a member of Headquarters Detachment, United States Army General Depot Activity, United States Forces, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 August 1964, near Croix Chapeau, France. While encamped on the bank of the Blavet River, France, Sergant Miller heard frantic cries for help coming from the river and observed three youths struggling to hold on to a small sailing skiff that had capsized in the swift current of the water. With complete disregard for his own safety, Sergeant Miller dove into the water, fought a treacherous undercurrent, and swam to the overturned boat. By simultaneously swimming and towing a raft that had been floating

near the accident, he succeeded in reaching the shore with two of the teen-agers on top of the raft. He then continued his courageous efforts by returning to the river and rescuing the third boy. Sergeant Miller's prompt actions, determination, and heroic conduct in this emergency are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) awarded to Sergeant Miller for heroism on 8 August 1964, as announced in General Orders Number 12, Headquarters U.S. Army Communications Zone, Europe, APO U.S. Forces 09058, dated 22 January 1965.)

Specialist Four LeRoy R. Purdy, Jr., , United States Army, as a member of Battery C, 1st Missile Battalion (Hercules), 254th Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism on 27 September 1964, in South Plainfield, New Jersey. It was dawn when Specialist Purdy and a fellow soldier noticed that a house adjacent to the military installation was on fire. He immediately notified the unit's switchboard operator to call the fire department and then ran to the scene of the fire to render assistance. With complete disregard for his own safety, he entered the burning dwelling, woke up a women, and led her through the dense smoke to safety. After a local patrolman arrived on the scene, Specialist Purdy, re-entered the blazing structure to search for other occupants and, when the patrolman became surrounded by flames and sustained eye burns, Specialist Purdy led him to safety. Specialist Purdy's prompt action, sound judgment, and heroic conduct in this emergency are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

First Sergeant Chester R. Rackley, , United States Army, as a member of Company B, 3d Battalion, 66th Armor, 2d Armored Division, distinguished himself by heroism in Germany, on 30 October 1963. When Sergeant Rackley heard the sound of a violent explosion and saw flames shooting out of the turret of a Company tank fully loaded with ammunition, he rushed to the scene to aid an injured crew member who had managed to reach the deck of the tank. With complete disregard for his own safety, Sergeant Rackley unhesitatingly approached the extremely dangerous tank and pulled the severely burned crewman away from it. Despite the hazardous situation, he continued his courageous efforts by participating in the evacuation of another crewman moments before the ammunition exploded again. Sergeant Rackley's prompt action, heroic conduct, and deep concern for his fellow soldiers are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Sergeant Rackley for meritorious achievement as announced in General Orders Number 167, Headquarters 2d Armored Division, dated 23 July 1964.)

Specialist Four *Hans J. Rudolph*, , United States Army, as a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 13th Infantry, distinguished himself by heroism on 27 July 1964, near

Micheistadt, Germany. When informed that urgent assistance was needed at the scene of an accident in which an Army truck, carrying sixteen tons of 155mm ammunition, had turned over, started to burn, and pinned the driver beneath the wreckage, Specialist Rudolph unhesitatingly volunteered to participate in the rescue effort. As he and the rescue party arrived in a vehicle (Tracked Recovery) at the accident site in a wooded area, the exploding 155mm shells had started a number of brush fires and one serious fire threatened 40,000 acres of prime coniferous forest. With complete disregard for his own safety and ignoring the exploding shells and fire, he rode to the area of the wreckage where exploding shells prevented the evacuation of the truck driver. When the hazardous situation required that the rescue vehicle be moved to a safe location, he dismounted, crawled through brush fires, and succeeded in reaching the truck. Private First Class Richard L. Tilley, , United States Army, as a member of Company C, 299th Engineer Battalion, Fort Gordon, Georgia, distinguished himself by heroism on 1 December 1964, in Aiken, South Carolina. Private Tilley was driving through Aiken around midnight when he noticed a home on fire. As he stopped his car at the scene of the fire, a man rushed up to him and told him that a little girl was trapped in a rear bedroom. With complete disregard for his own safety, Private Tilley entered the burning dwelling through the bedroom window, searched through dense smoke for the child, and found her unconscious from smoke inhalation. He quickly picked her up and succeeded in backing out of the window and placing the child on the ground moments before he was overcome from the extreme exposure to the smoke. By the time he recovered, the child had been rushed to a hospital where she was revived. Private Tilley's prompt actions, heroic conduct, and voluntary risk of his own life are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Private Tilley for an act of heroism on 1 December 1964 as announced in General Orders Number 7, Headquarters, United States Army School/Training Center, Fort Gordon, Georgia, dated 20 January 1965.)

Private First Class Joseph E. White, , United States Army, as a member of Company C, United States Army Special Forces Training Group (Airborne), distinguished himself by heroism on 9 January 1965 while participating in a training airborne operation at Hondo Drop Zone, Hondo Air Force Base, Texas. After Private White, had jumped from an aircraft in flight and was being deployed by his parachute, he noticed that the parachutist above him had a collapsed parachute canopy. As the falling parachutist passed him, Private White completely dis-

regarded his own safety, grabbed the malfunctioning canopy, and held on to it until he and his fellow jumper landed safely. Despite the hazards of the additional weight and the possible loss of maneuverability during the descent, he succeeded in an extremely dangerous rescue effort that saved the life of his fellow parachutist. Private White's prompt action and heroic conduct in this dangerous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.
