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I. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved, 25 July 1963, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action is awarded to:

Captain *Wallace E. Viau*, Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations involving an opposing armed force in the Republic of Vietnam on 8 March 1965. As a Senior Advisor serving with the United States Army Special Forces at Camp Kannack in the southern area of the Republic of Vietnam, Captain *Viau* demonstrated fortitude and determination when the Camp was attacked during the night by a fanatical and numerically superior hostile force with a tactical advantage. With complete disregard for his own safety, he repeatedly exposed himself to intense small arms fire and heavy bombardment by moving from bunker to bunker to insure that they were manned, to aid and encourage the defenders, and to direct the defense operation. At the height of the battle, he bravely and unhesitatingly crossed sixty yards of open terrain under heavy enemy fire to administer first aid to a critically wounded American serviceman. Upon learning that an outpost had fallen he again exposed himself to the Viet Cong gunfire and succeeded in reaching a precarious position in close proximity of the enemy. From this dangerous position, he directed mortar and other weapons fire, disrupting enemy attacks from that direction. He then organized and led a counterattack against stubborn resistance which resulted in the recapturing of the outpost and destroying the enemy who held the position. When the long awaited daylight brought defeat to the enemy, he personally led a combat patrol against the withdrawing Viet Cong which was highly effective in annihilating more of the enemy. Throughout the violent battle that lasted approximately eight hours, he displayed indomitable courage and professional skill which inspired the defenders and contributed to the successful defense of the Camp and to the repelling of the insurgent forces. Captain *Viau's* conspicuous gallantry and extraordinary heroic actions are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of his country. VIII. DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Distinguished Flying Cross for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded, posthumously, by the Department of the Army to:

Captain *Daniel G. Dawson*, , Infantry (then First Lieutenant), United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism and extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight in the Republic of Vietnam from 10 July to 12 July 1964. As a pilot of unarmed Army aircraft, Captain *Dawson* demonstrated indomitable courage and professional skill while performing many reconnaissance missions in support of Vietnamese military operations. He was flying an observation mission for two Ranger Battalions when two Vietnam Air Force aircraft became disoriented and began making strikes on the friendly troops. Despite the gunfire from the two fighter planes and the intensive ground fire from nearby Viet Cong forces, he bravely placed his aircraft between the striking planes and the friendly troops, circling the friendly positions at low altitude until the striking aircraft left the area. During later operations, he continued to display his determination and complete disregard for his own safety by directing armed helicopters and fighter aircraft into Viet Cong positions, by directing artillery adjustments, and by directing medical evacuations. Through his fortitude, unique flying skill, and participation in many night missions, he saved the lives of numerous Vietnamese soldiers and contributed to the progress of the United States effort in the Republic of Vietnam. Captain *Dawson's* heroic conduct and outstanding flying ability during this critical situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect distinct credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of his country.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Distinguished Flying Cross (First Oak Leaf Cluster) for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Major *Richard W. Kohlbrand, Jr.*, , Infantry, United States Army, as a member of the Office of the United States Army Attaché, Leopoldville, Democratic Republic of the Congo, distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight in the Republic of the Congo on 9 October 1964. As a pilot of United States Army aircraft, Major *Kohlbrand* demonstrated fortitude, professional skill, and determination while engaged in a combined reconnaissance and rescue mission in support of the United Nations operations after an uprising in the Republic of the Congo. With full knowledge of the hazards, he unhesitatingly volunteered to fly into a dangerous area to rescue the pilot and passenger of a downed United Nations aircraft. Although the

airfield upon which he landed at Lodja was the scene of hostile activity, he bravely remained until the pilot and passenger, along with two severely wounded government soldiers and a European doctor, were ready for evacuation. During this waiting period of over an hour, he made arrangements with the local troop commander for the evacuation of thirty additional European hostages on the following day. Through his indomitable courage, outstanding flying ability, and profound concern for the welfare of mankind, he contributed in great measure to the timely accomplishment of a most humanitarian mission. Major *Kohlbrand's* heroic conduct, perseverance, and unique flying ability throughout this perilous aerial rescue mission are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect distinct credit upon himself and the military service.

IX--SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Specialist Six *Norman E. Brown*, , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism while serving as a member of Headquarters Company, 22d Signal Group, on 2 June 1965, near Mannheim, Germany. Specialist *Brown* was serving as Crew Chief aboard an Army CH-34C helicopter when it crashed, its engine caught fire, and threatened the lives of nine persons. After the initial impact, he immediately directed the orderly and expeditious evacuation of seven uninjured passengers from the burning aircraft. Then, with complete disregard for his own safety and ignoring the imminent danger of a fuel explosion, he attempted to extricate the two remaining injured passengers. Unable to do so alone, he remained with them inside the aircraft until the fire was extinguished and assistance to remove the injured could be summoned. Although he sustained back injuries himself, which later resulted in extended hospitalization, he still exposed himself to the danger of residual fire, refused medical attention, and remained in the aircraft until valuable equipment and documents were removed. Specialist *Brown's* heroic conduct, prompt actions, and sound judgment in this hazardous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Staff Sergeant *Loyd D. Chappell*, , United States Army, as a member of Headquarters Company, United States Army Hospital, Fort Jackson, South Carolina distinguished himself by heroism on 26 July 1965, near Columbia, South Carolina. Staff Sergeant *Chappell* was conducting personal business in a civilian agency when he heard a loud noise and then saw a flaming truck, loaded with lumber, skidding along the highway in an upturned position. He rushed to the scene of the accident and, with complete disregard for his own safety, forced his way into the blazing vehicle and assisted the helpless driver to a place of safety. After administering professional first aid to the driver, Staff Sergeant *Chappell* returned to the wrecked vehicle to make certain that there were no other occupants in it. Although he modestly departed from the scene without identifying himself, he was later identified in police reports as the person who participated in this courageous rescue effort. Staff Sergeant *Chappell's* prompt and heroic action in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Specialist Six *Richard E. Murray*, , United States Army, as a member of the 254th Medical Detachment (Helicopter Ambulance), United

States Army Hospital, Fort Carson, Colorado, distinguished himself by heroism on 18 June 1965 while participating in flood relief efforts in the vicinity of Last Chance, Colorado. Specialist *Murray* was aboard a helicopter ambulance helping to evacuate people from the disaster area when a call was received requesting the rescue of a man stranded on top of a truck in the midst of raging flood waters. Despite the strong gusty winds, the pilot succeeded in hovering the helicopter over the truck and a rope was extended to the man. After the rope was secured and the helicopter moved up and away, the rope failed and the man dropped into the water. Without hesitation, Specialist *Murray* jumped from the helicopter into the water and held the unconscious man above the water. He then grabbed the rope and, while holding the victim, was towed by helicopter to a shoreline. Although he sustained severe bruises and flesh cuts while being dragged through the water, he ignored his own discomforts and immediately administered artificial respiration to the victim. He continued his efforts until the helicopter ambulance landed and the man was placed on board. Specialist *Murray's* heroic conduct, prompt actions, and complete disregard for his own safety in this emergency situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Specialist *Murray* for heroism on 18 June 1965 as announced in General Orders Number 227, Headquarters, 5th Infantry Division (Mechanized) and Fort Carson, dated 22 July 1965.)

Private First Class *Wilgus H. Walters, Jr.*, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism on 7 December 1964 at the 19th United States Army Missile Detachment in Greece. Private *Walters* was in a nearby Day Room when he saw flames shooting out of the door of the boiler room of the mess hall. He picked up a fire extinguisher, rushed to the scene of the fire, and observed fuel spilling on the blaze through a damaged electrical connection. Despite warnings by fellow soldiers of the impending explosion of the fuel oil tank in the burning building, he displayed complete disregard for his own safety and entered the boiler room that was already engulfed in flames. Although he sustained many severe shocks by the shorted electrical connections, he remained in the blazing inferno for over twenty minutes and succeeded in controlling the fire. His prompt actions and indomitable courage were responsible for saving the entire building from total destruction. Private *Walters'* heroic conduct in this hazardous emergency situation is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

X. BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944, a Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States is awarded to:

Staff Sergeant *Paul W. DeLong*, United States Army. October 1944 to July 1945.

XI. AIR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Captain *Walter M. Littleton*, Artillery, while serving as a member of Company A, 7th Aviation Battalion, 7th Infantry Division, dis-

tinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight in the vicinity of Chorwon, Korea on 1 March 1965. When informed of the need of an aerial operation to recover the body of a hunter from a known but uncharted minefield, Captain *Littleton* unhesitatingly volunteered as co-pilot of an Army CH-21 helicopter for the dangerous mission. With fortitude, perseverance, and exceptional flying ability, he and the pilot skillfully maneuvered the helicopter over a mine infested area while the crew chief and the assistant crew chief hung from the door of the aircraft and attached a rope to the body of the hunter killed by a mine. Although forced to hover the helicopter inches above the ground for over an hour before recovery of the body was finally achieved, he displayed professional competence, determination, and courage which resulted in the success of the difficult evacuation mission. Captain *Littleton's* heroism and outstanding flying ability in this hazardous recovery operation reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal for heroism 1 March 1965, as announced in General Orders Number 125, Headquarters, 7th Infantry Division, APO San Francisco, 96207, dated 15 March 1965.)
