VIII--SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to the following:

Staff Sergeant *Edward A. Anderson*, , United States Army,

while serving as a member of Battery D, 1st Training Battalion (Air Defense), 1st Air Defense Guided Missile Brigade (Training), Fort Bliss, Texas, distinguished himself by heroism on 18 June 1965 in El Paso, Tex. While shopping at a downtown department store, Staff Sergeant *Anderson* noticed a man rush through the side door of the store and then heard the voice of a bank cashier yelling, "Stop him, he's a bank robber." With complete disregard for his own safety, Sergeant *Anderson* pursued the alleged robber, caught up with him in a store aisle, and attempted to tackle the suspect. Although Sergeant *Anderson* fell to the floor and injured his knee in this action, he ignored his injury, chased the suspect to a parking lot, and shouted, "Stop, or I'll shoot." As the fugitive threw two money bags containing large sums to the ground and continued to flee, Sergeant *Anderson* continued to chase him through streets and alleys. After a mile and a half chase and a temporary loss of the whereabouts of the robber, Sergeant *Anderson* searched a garbage container in a parking lot and discovered the robber digging into the debris in an effort to hide. Sergeant *Anderson* climbed into the container, physically subdued the man, pulled him from the container, and held him until the police arrived on the scene. Through his determination and fortitude, he aided the law enforcement officers in the capture of a bank robber. Sergeant *Anderson's* heroic conduct in this hazardous situation is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain *Philip E. Courts*, , Infantry, United States Army, while serving as a member of Company C, 228th Assault Support Helicopter Battalion, 11th Air Assault Division, distinguished himself by heroism on 4 March 1965, in the vicinity of McKenna Army Airfield, Fort Benning, Georgia. During a transition training flight, Captain *Courts* was serving as first pilot aboard a CH-47A helicopter when it crashed after its engine failed and the aircraft caught on fire. Although he had managed to free himself from the burning helicopter, he quickly realized that his instructor pilot was still strapped to his seat. Then, with complete disregard for his own safety and despite the danger of the fuel tanks exploding, he re-entered the aircraft and, by exerting extreme effort, succeeded in extricating the dazed instructor pilot from his pinned position in the helicopter and in assisting him to a place of safety. Captain *Courts'* heroic conduct and prompt actions in this hazardous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Major *Jose A. Esteras-Fortuno*, , Infantry, United States Army, while serving as a member of Headquarters 1st Brigade, 2d Infantry Division, distinguished himself by heroism in Korea on 15 July 1965. While participating in emergency and relief operations during a flood which devastated the village of Nullo-Ri, South Korea, Major *Esteras-Fortuno* was informed that a young woman had been swept into a culvert and carried toward a river by the rushing water. He ran to the scene and quickly saw her in the river. Then, with complete disregard for his own safety, he jumped into the swift, hazardous, and debris-filled river, swam to the victim, and pulled her to the water's edge. Although near complete exhaustion and requiring assistance of others to pull himself and the young woman from the raging waters, he immediately picked her up and carried her to the nearest medical clinic where she was revived by a local doctor. Major *Esteras-Fortuno's* deep concern for

while serving as a member of Airfield Company, United States Army Aviation Center Troop Brigade (Provisional), United States Army Aviation Center, Fort Rucker, Alabama, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 June 1965, at Lowe Army Airfield, Fort Rucker. Private *Moreno* was engaged in normal duties when a tanker containing 7,000 gallons of high octane aviation gasoline approached the petroleum, oils, and lubricants storage tank area with smoke coming from the right rear wheels. Without hesitation or concern for his own safety, he obtained a fire extinguisher, crawled beneath the tanker, and fought the fire until it was extinguished. Through his courage, he participated in a hazardous action which prevented possible loss of life and an explosion of the tanker as well as a more serious fire in the petroleum, oils, and lubricants storage area. Private *Moreno's* heroic conduct and prompt action in this emergency situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Lieutenant Colonel *James W. Mulford*, , Military Police Corps, United States Army, while serving as Provost Marshal, Fort Devens, Massachusetts, distinguished himself by heroism at Fort Devens, on 19 April 1965. Upon his arrival at a house to investigate a disturbance, Colonel *Mulford* discovered that a father of two small children had gone berserk, was armed with a loaded shotgun, had already fired one round, and had made several threats to shoot the children and others present. After talking to the armed parent, Colonel *Mulford* succeeded in entering the house and, 5 minutes later, came out of the dwelling carrying the two children. Then as he continued to demonstrate his complete disregard for his own safety and attempted to re-enter the house to disarm the subject, the enraged man fired a round from the shotgun into the ceiling over the head of Colonel *Mulford*. Despite the dangerous situation, Colonel *Mulford* remained calm, succeeded in disarming the man and in subduing him until other military police arrived on the scene to restrain the offender. Colonel *Mulford's* sound judgment, courage, and heroic conduct in this hazardous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal for heroism on 19 April 1965, as announced in General Orders Number 100, Headquarters Fort Devens, Fort Devens, Massachusetts, 01433, dated 19 August 1965.)

Specialist Four *Tommie L. Purife*, , United States Army, while serving as a member of Airfield Company, United States Army Aviation Center Troop Brigade (Provisional), United States Army Aviation Center, Fort Rucker, Alabama, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 June 1965, at Lowe Army Airfield, Fort Rucker. Specialist *Purife* was engaged in normal duties when a tanker containing 7,000 gallons of high octane aviation gasoline approached the petroleum, oils, and lubricants storage tank area with smoke coming from the right rear wheels. Without hesitation or concern for his own safety, he obtained a fire extinguisher, crawled beneath the tanker, and fought the fire until it was extinguished. Through his courage, he participated in a hazardous action which prevented possible loss of life and an explosion of the tanker as well as a more serious fire in the petroleum, oils, and lubricants storage area. Specialist *Purife's* heroic conduct and prompt action in this emergency situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

IX. AIR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to the following:

Major *Dallas D. Goodwin*, , Medical Service Corps, United States Army, while serving as a member of the 254th Medical Detachment (Helicopter Ambulance), distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight in support of flood rescue activities in the vicinity of Denver, Colorado, during the period 16 June to 21 June 1965. As a UH-1D helicopter pilot, Major *Goodwin* demonstrated outstanding flying ability, sound judgment, and perseverance while engaged in a mission to rescue a great number of persons from inundated regions and raging flood waters. Although constantly endangered by severe turbulence, grossly reduced visibility, and long periods of operation without a copilot, which included over 40 hours of such flight, he actively participated in the rescue of more than 400 persons from the hazardous flood area. Despite the absence of lights and normal landing facilities, he made hundreds of landings and takeoffs in the hours of darkness. Major *Goodwin's* heroic conduct, courageous efforts, and unique flying skill throughout this perilous rescue mission reflect distinct credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Captain *Harry V. Phillips, Jr.*, , Medical Service Corps, United States Army, while serving as a member of the 254th Medical Detachment (Helicopter Ambulance), distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight in support of flood rescue activities in the vicinity of Denver, Colorado, during the period 16 June to 21 June 1965. Shaw, Jr.*, , Medical Service Corps, United States Army, while serving as a member of the 254th Medical Detachment (Helicopter Ambulance), distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight in support of flood rescue activities in the vicinity of Denver, Colorado, during the period 16 June to 21 June 1965. As a UH-1D helicopter pilot, Lieutenant *Shaw* demonstrated outstanding flying ability, sound judgment, and perseverance while engaged in a mission to rescue a great number of persons from inundated regions and raging flood waters. Although constantly endangered by severe turbulence, grossly reduced visibility, and long periods of operation without a copilot, which included over 40 hours of such flight, he actively participated in the rescue of more than 400 persons from the hazardous flood area. Despite the absence of lights and normal landing facilities, he made hundreds of landings and takeoffs in the hours of dark-

the welfare of others, and prompt and heroic conduct in this dangerous situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the award of the Army Commendation Medal to Major *Esteras-Fortuno* for heroism on 15 July 1965 as announced in General Orders Number 68, Headquarters 2d Infantry Division, dated 27 October 1965.)

Private First Class *Anthony P. Hladki*, , United States Army, while serving as a member of Company C, 802d Engineer Battalion (Construction), distinguished himself by heroism on the night of 21 July 1965, near Seoul, Korea. Private *Hladki* was working at a ferry site during a flood of the Han River when he heard screams and saw a Korean girl struggling in the swift current of the river. With complete disregard for his own safety, he rushed into the deep, turbulent stream fully clothed and wearing web equipment to rescue the girl. Through his determination, he succeeded in reaching her and bringing her to the safety of the shore where first aid treatment was quickly administered prior to her rapid evacuation to a local hospital. Private *Hladki's* deep concern for the welfare of others and heroic and prompt actions in this emergency are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Specialist Four *Francis A. Holtet*, , United States Army, while serving as a member of Battery B, 2d Missile Battalion, 56th Artillery, distinguished himself by heroism at Landau/Pfalz, Germany on 13 February 1965. With complete disregard for personal safety, he pursued, disarmed, and captured a reformatory escapee, who was fleeing after attempting a robbery of a German drug store and assaulting the resisting proprietor with a hammer. Specialist *Holtet* held the thief until the arrival of the German police. Although he quietly left the scene after his act of bravery, he was later identified and accorded most favorable publicity by the German press which significantly enhanced the prestige of the American soldier in Germany. Specialist *Holtet's* prompt and heroic action reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist *Holtet* for heroism on 13 February 1965, as announced in General Orders Number 106, Headquarters, Seventh Army, dated 20 October 1965.)

Staff Sergeant *George O. Jenkins*, , United States Army, while serving as a member of Airfield Company, United States Army Aviation Center Troop Brigade (Provisional), United States Army Aviation Center, Fort Rucker, Alabama, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 June 1965, at Lowe Army Airfield, Fort Rucker. Sergeant *Jenkins* was engaged in normal duties when a tanker containing 7,000 gallons of high octane aviation gasoline approached the petroleum, oils, and lubricants storage tank area with smoke coming from the right rear wheels. Without hesitation or concern for his own safety, he obtained a fire extinguisher, crawled beneath the tanker, and fought the fire until it was extinguished. Through his courage, he participated in a hazardous action which prevented possible loss of life and an explosion of the tanker as well as a more serious fire in the petroleum, oils, and lubricants storage area. Sergeant *Jenkins'* heroic conduct and prompt action in this emergency situation are in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Captain *Harold B. Snyder, Jr.*, Infantry, United States Army, as a member of Company B, 5th Aviation Battalion, distinguished himself by heroism while participating in aerial flight in Colorado on 19 June 1965. As the pilot of an Army helicopter, Captain *Snyder* displayed unique flying skill and fortitude in the performance of a dangerous mission to evacuate flood victims from isolated areas in Colorado. While flying over the La Junta region, he was notified of the need of an aeromedical evacuation of a woman and three children who were severely burned and required transportation from a limited medical facility in Lamar, Colorado to a hospital in Denver. Captain *Snyder* responded immediately and flew the 60-mile flight at night during severe thunderstorm activity. Despite the absence of landing lights at Lamar, he succeeded in landing the aircraft alongside the Armory with only a flashlight to guide the helicopter to touchdown. As soon as the casualties and a doctor and a nurse were loaded aboard the helicopter, he continued to demonstrate his outstanding flying ability and determination by flying 150 miles in 1½ hours to Denver in the midst of extreme turbulence. After this part of the hazardous mission was completed, he again volunteered to fly the medical personnel back to Lamar as their services were needed for the care of other flood victims in that area. Although exposed to the same perilous weather conditions as in the previous flights, he again successfully completed the flight, landing again with only the light of a flashlight at the Armory. Captain *Snyder's* courageous actions and superb flying ability during this emergency situation reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.
