II_SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918, a Silver Star for gallantry in action is awarded to:

Major Boque P. Harrison. , United States Air Force, who distinguished himself on 26 May 1967, while serving as a forward air controller in direct support of ground combat operations of the 2d Battalion, 14th Infantry, 25th Infantry Division in the Republic of Vietnam, During the early afternoon hours, two companies of the 2d Battalion, 14th Infantry became engaged with a Viet Cong force in well fortified and camouflaged positions, For a period of three hours Major Harrison directed two tactical air strikes in support of the lead elements of Company A, 2d Battalion, 14th Infantry. These air strikes were brought within 50 meters of a heavily engaged platoon and materially assisted in the evacuation of the dead and wounded personnel. He assumed control of the battalion maneuver forces when the battalion commander had to leave the area for fuel. During this period he directed two medical evacuation helicopter fire teams. Major Harrison continued his efforts by sighting and locating Viet Cong positions that were in close proximity to the left flank platoon of Company C, 2d Battalion, 14th Infantry. These Viet Cong positions were so located that it would have been extremely hazardous to friendly troops to bring either tactical air or other supporting fires. Major Harrison asked for permission from the battalion commander to fly into these positions and mark them with white smoke grenades, in an effort to make the Viet Cong believe that an airstrike would follow. Through enemy small arms fire Major Harrison made repeated low level passes marking the drawal, exposing them to friendly ground fire and allowed Company C, to continue its attack onto their objective. His actions are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Air Force.

V_SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Cadet George W. Albrecht, , United States Corps of Cadets, United States Military Academy, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic action on 19 August 1967, in the vicinity of Munich, Germany. While walking along the bank of the Isar River, Cadet Albrecht heard a cry for help. He looked into the river and saw a man struggling against the current and undertow created by a nearby spillway. With complete disregard for his own safety, Cadet Albrecht jumped fully clothed into the raging torrent of the Isar River, swam to the struggling man and pulled him safely to shore. By his heroism, Cadet Albrecht displayed outstanding personal courage, initiative, and stamina throughout his rescue efforts. Cadet Albrecht's complete disregard for his own safety and his courageous actions reflect great credit upon himself, the United States Military Academy, and the United States Army.

Specialist Four *Donald M. Strukamp*, . United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism after being awakened on the morning of 22 November 1967 at 0430 by the smell of smoke. Hurrying out of his Glendale, California home, he discovered that the home next door was on fire and smoking heavily. The owners of the home had become overcome by the flames and smoke and were forced to abandon the house before being able to get to their ninemonth-old daughter. Upon learning of this, Specialist *Strukamp* entered the building knowing full well the danger and crawled to the room where the baby was sleeping. He then retrieved the infant and handed her through a window to the anxious parents and then crawled to safety himself. This act of heroism has been keenly noted and appreciated by the City of Glendale as well as by the victims and reflects great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

VI_BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal with V device for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded to:

Sergeant First Class Salvatore A. Rende. , United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism, not involving participation in aerial flight, in connection with military operations against a hostile force on 22 March 1965 while serving as an advisor to a Civilian Irregular Defense Group company during a search and destroy operation in the southwestern portion of Loc Ninh District, Binh Long Province, Republic of Vietnam. When the lead element of the friendly force was taken under intense automatic fire by a well-concealed Viet Cong force, wounding the point man and pinning down the friendly element, Sergeant Rende unhesitatingly and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, single-handedly assaulted the Viet Cong position, killing the insurgent manning the automatic weapon. After moving the wounded soldier to a safer position, Sergeant Rende continued his assault of the Viet Cong positions. Inspired by the fearless act of Sergeant Rende, the remainder of the Civilian Irregular Defense Group troopers rose from the ground and joined him in assault. As a result, a Viet Cong headquarters and hospital complex was overrun and captured. Through his courage and outstanding leadership, he contributed immeasurably to the success of the mission. Sergeant Rende's personal bravery and devotion to duty were in keeping with

the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

VII_BRONZE STAR MEDAL. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944, the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States is awarded to:

VIII_AIR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

. United States Army, Specialist Six Charles A. Broneman, distinguished himself by heroic action on 24 October 1967 in Seoul, Korea. As one of the crew members of a UH-1B helicopter, he helped in saving the lives of approximately 40 people trapped on the roof of a burning building in downtown Seoul. After the helicopter succeeded in landing on the roof of the burning building, Specialist Breneman was highly instrumental in calming the frantic people, frightened by the raging flames and the great amount of smoke, and preventing chaos. He then supervised the loading of the helicopter. In order to evacuate a maximum number of people in the helicopter it was necessary for Specialist Breneman to hang to the open door. The helicopter made three trips through intense fire and smoke and the crew successfully saved the lives of all the trapped people. Specialist Breneman's heroic actions are exemplary of the highest traditions of the United States Army. His courageous actions are not only a credit to himself but to his command and to his country. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist Six Breneman as announced in General Order Number 1. Headquarters Eighth United States Army, dated 5 January 1968.)

Specialist Five Charles W. Sheppard, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroic action on 24 October 1967 in Seoul, Korea. As the crew chief of UH-1B helicopter, he helped in saving the lives of approximately forty people trapped on the roof of a burning building in downtown Seoul. After the helicopter succeeded in landing on the roof of the burning building, Specialist Sheppard was highly instrumental in calming the frantic people, frightened by the raging flames and the great amount of smoke, and preventing chaos. Specialist Sheppard supervised the loading of the aircraft during the three trips through intense fire and smoke that were necessary in

order to save the people that were endangered. The lives of all the trapped people were successfully saved and Specialist *Sheppard*'s heroic actions are to be highly commended. His courageous actions are not only a credit to himself, but to his command and to his country. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist Five *Sheppard* as announced in General Order Number 1, Headquarters Eighth United States Army, dated 5 January 1968.)

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal (Second Oak Leaf Cluster) with "V" device for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

, United States Air Force, distin-Major Robert H. Ransley, guished himself on 6 August 1967 by heroic action while acting as Forward Air Controller for "White Rock," a battalion-size CIDG Heliborne operation in Tay Ninh province, Republic of Vietnam. Flying to the landing zone before the operation, Major Ransley called for a 30-minute weather hold due to the low cloud cover on the landing zone. During this time Major Ransley called in artillery fires on the landing zone. When the tactical air ships arrived on station. Major Ransley held them until the weather began to break, then began calling in the airstrikes. In spite of the marginal weather, Major Ransley made numerous low-level passes to spot the bombs, each time exposing himself to fire from the ground. Throughout the operation, Major Ransley coordinated the fires of artillery, F-100's, Vietnamese A1-E's, and armed gunships. In spite of the marginal weather and enemy fire, Major Ransley retained complete control of the situation. As a result, the heliborne forces landed without incident. Major Ransley's heroic actions are in keeping with the highest traditions of the inter-service cooperation and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

3. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal (Third Oak Leaf Cluster) with "V" device for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Captain Aaron M. Mixon, III. (then First Lieutenant), United States Marine Corps, distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on 14 February 1966 while performing duty as an aerial observer during a combat operation near Quang Ngai, Vietnam. Captain Mixon was aboard a light observation aircraft on a visual reconnaissance mission during Operation DOUBLE EAGLE, PHASE 1. During the flight numerous heavily armed Viet Cong were spotted in a trench. Despite deteriorating weather the pilot and Captain Mixon were successful in identifying the target with smoke and remained in the area to direct the armed helicopters. After the helicopters had expended their ordnance the pilot and Captain Mixon made a low pass over the area to analyze the target damage. As intense ground fire was being directed at their aircraft Captain Mixon called for artillery fire to eliminate the Viet Cong positions. Regardless of the dangers involved in flying at altitudes of 100 feet, the pilot and Captain Mixon remained to adjust the artillery fire on the new positions. A final low pass revealed several burning huts and the bodies of four dead Viet Cong. After determining that the target had been effectively neutralized the pilot and observer returned to the staging airfield. Captain Mixon's heroic

actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Marine Corps.

IX_AIR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal and Air Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) thereto for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Lieutenant Colonel *Theodore S. Spiker*, Artillery, United States Army. 23 January 1967 to 24 November 1967.

X_ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL. By direction of the Secretary of the Army, under the provisions of paragraph 33, AR 672-5-1, the Army Commendation Medal with "V" device for heroism is awarded to:

Major William H. Heltzel, Jr., , United States Air Force, distinguished himself by heroism on 14 September 1966, while serving as pilot of a CV-2 aircraft during an emergency resupply mission to an airfield near Bong Son, Republic of Vietnam. The mission was successfully completed in spite of numerous hazards to flight, including poor weather conditions, mountainous terrain, poor lighting on the extremely short runway, hostile ground fire and intense artillery fire along the route of flight. The professional competence and devotion to duty displayed by Major Heltzel are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Air Force.

Major Lawrence E. Kivisto. , United States Air Force, distinguished himself by gallantry in connection with military operations against the enemy as a Forward Air Controller directing fighter aircraft strikes and adjusting artillery and naval gunfire in Gio Linh District, Quang Tri Province, Republic of Vietnam on 26 September 1967. On that date, Major Kivisto was flying his O-1 Bird Dog aircraft in support of 2d Airborne Task Force, Army of the Republic of Vietnam Airborne Division. The mission of the 2d Airborne Task Force was to establish a defensive position 500 meters from the Demilitarized Zone between Gio Linh Outpost and the South China Sea. Major Kivisto, demonstrating outstanding airmanship and professional calmness under hostile fire, effectively utilized air power to neutralize North Vietnamese artillery positions which were inflicting casualties on friendly forces. Then he simultaneously adjusted artillery fire and naval gunfire on enemy mortar and recoilless rifle positions within the Demilitarized Zone. Major Kivisto displayed great heroism by continually flying over the enemy positions despite hostile ground fire in order to pinpoint enemy mortar and recoilless rifle positions. He then directed airstrikes on the enemy, completely destroying the mortar and recoilless rifle positions and inflicted heavy losses upon the enemy. By his heroic actions and unselfish dedication to duty, Major Kivisto has reflected great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

Major Glenn M. Luck, , United States Air Force, distinguished himself by heroism on 14 September 1966, while serving as pilot of a CV-2 aircraft during an emergency resupply mission to an airfield near Bong Son, Republic of Vietnam. The mission was successfully completed in spite of numerous hazards to flight, including poor weather conditions, mountainous terrain, poor lighting on the extremely short runway, hostile ground fire and

intense artillery fire along the route of flight. The professional competence and devotion to duty displayed by Major *Luck* are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Air Force.
