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I. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 25 July 1963, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism in action is awarded, posthumously, to:

First Lieutenant *Steven C. Drake*, O5334054, Infantry, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism while leading the 3d Platoon, Company C, 2d Battalion, 1st Infantry, against a vastly superior enemy force near Hiep Duc, Republic of Vietnam, on 5 and 6 January 1968. On the morning of 5 January 1968, his platoon became engaged in heavy combat with a numerically superior North Vietnamese Army force. Lieutenant *Drake* immediately organized a five man fire-team and courageously maneuvered this element into a supporting position near an enemy fortification. With complete and utter disregard for his own life, he left the cover of the base of fire, fearlessly charged the enemy fortified bunker, and destroyed an enemy machine gun and its crew. This daring action enabled his company to drive off the enemy. Late in the evening of the same day, the enemy launched a savage attack with overwhelming force. The first round fired by the enemy seriously wounded the company commander, who was evacuated immediately. Lieutenant *Drake* assumed command and inspired his men to repel the enemy's attack. The enemy, positioned on three sides of the company, began a murderous crossfire. Although disaster seemed imminent, Lieutenant *Drake* calmly and adeptly led his men through the withering fire to more defensible terrain. The thwarted enemy then launched intensive mortar and rocket attacks. Realizing that his company was becoming dispersed, Lieutenant *Drake* courageously exposed himself to the intense enemy fire to

consolidate his company. At this time he was severely wounded; nevertheless, he valiantly continued to move through the bullet-swept area and succeeded in re-establishing the company defensive perimeter. He organized and directed his company in repelling four human wave assaults on his position. Fearlessly he exposed himself to fire time and time again to direct the fire of his men. In order that gunships and artillery could locate his perimeter, Lieutenant *Drake* shot hand flares 10 feet in front of his position. At 0100 hours on the following morning, the infuriated enemy launched another savage mortar attack and again seriously wounded Lieutenant *Drake*. Unable to move from his position, he continued his relentless efforts to halt the enemy horde. In spite of the heroic defense of the perimeter, the overwhelming strength of the enemy permitted a few insurgents to maneuver within hand grenade range. A volley of hand grenades was thrown into the company's position. Thinking only of the safety of his men, Lieutenant *Drake* lunged for the threatening grenade and attempted to throw it out. The resultant explosion mortally wounded Lieutenant *Drake*. His heroic action saved the lives of all others in the area. Through his indomitable courage, complete disregard for his own safety, and profound concern for his fellow soldiers, Lieutenant *Drake* prevented additional casualties and inspired his men to successfully engage and repel the enemy. Lieutenant *Drake's* conspicuous gallantry and extraordinary heroism are in the highest tradition of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces of his country.

III--SILVER STAR. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 9 July 1918, a Silver Star for gallantry in action is awarded to:

Captain *James W. Sisemore*, FV3101486, United States Air Force, 20th TASS, attached to Company C, 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), 1st Special Forces, distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on 25 February 1968 while performing duties as a Forward Air Controller for a United States Army Special Forces-advised Civilian Irregular Defense Group (CIDG) resupply convoy proceeding from Danang to Thuong Duc Special Forces Camp, Republic of Vietnam. Proceeding without incident for a period of time, an ambush was suddenly initiated stopping the lead vehicle and making it impossible for the remainder of the convoy to continue. Captain *Sisemore* immediately began relaying information to the ground troops as well as to higher headquarters. As the enemy attempted to set fire to two of the vehicles, Captain *Sisemore* made a strafing run causing the enemy to disperse. He made continuous runs at an extremely low altitude although a considerable volume of enemy automatic weapons fire was being directed at the aircraft each time. After taking several hits and exhausting all available ordnance, and being dangerously low on fuel, he was forced to return to Danang. Returning to the scene of the action he coordinated landing zones for incoming heliborne reaction forces and medical evacuation (MEDEVAC) helicopters as well as continuing to make strafing runs. Two of these low level strafing runs were over open rice paddies, enabling the friendly force to regain its momentum and forcing the enemy to break contact. Captain *Sisemore* continued to escort the convoy to its destination although dangerously low on fuel. Captain *Sisemore's* gallantry was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Air Force.

IX. DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 2 July 1926, a Distinguished Flying Cross for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Captain *Franklin D. Meredith*, FV3066568, United States Air Force, 5th Air Command Squadron "E" Flight, who distinguished himself by heroism while participating in an aerial flight on 28 June 1967 while flying a psychological operation support mission in the Republic of Vietnam. The mission was to be accomplished over an area where the troops were in heavy contact and the cloud cover was below the ceiling called for in normal operations. Disregarding this, Captain *Meredith* located the ground elements and began his psychological operation support mission even with prior knowledge that the enemy possessed at least two .50 calibre and four .30 calibre machine guns. Shortly after arrival in the area Captain *Meredith* noticed a friendly unit that was pinned down and taking casualties. Captain *Meredith* contacted the helicopter gunships and with complete disregard for his own safety led the gunships to the target and effectively marked it. There were some 950 widely dispersed friendly troops committed to this operation. Heavy rain had begun and this forced the com-

mand and control helicopter out of the area resulting in a loss of communication between the commander and his units. Captain *Meredith*, seeing the danger of this situation, informed the commander that he would act as his forward control station. For more than an hour Captain *Meredith* relayed all operational radio traffic. He maneuvered at low altitudes disregarding his personal safety and assisted the units in identifying each other. Captain *Meredith* continued his mission a full three hours and only left the area when he knew that the command and control ship could again control the embattled units. Captain *Meredith's* actions were in keeping with the highest standards of the United States Air Force and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States armed forces.

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved 2 July 1926, a Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Major General *Doan Van Quang*, 43/300.953, Army of the Republic of Vietnam, Commanding General, Vietnamese Special Forces Republic of Vietnam, distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions on 21 October 1967 while directing the hazardous extraction of a combined United States/Vietnam Army long range reconnaissance team and its airborne ranger platoon reaction force from the enemy dominated An Hoa Valley region in the Republic of Vietnam. The two forces which were on the ground requested extraction after the situation appeared perilous and the mission had been successfully completed. Carefully monitoring the tense situation over the tactical radio at the forward operational base, Major General *Doan Van Quang* prudently decided to execute the hazardous extraction rather than further subject the small element to possible annihilation by a larger enemy force thought to be in the area. Major General *Doan Van Quang* requested a tactical air cap be placed over the joint element and then immediately boarded the command and control ship departing for the extraction LZ. Upon reaching the area, the weather had deteriorated augmenting the dangers inherent in the extraction from enemy infested territory. This condition necessitated operation of the command and control ship at a mere 400 to 500 feet above the ground in a small compartmented valley. Major General *Doan Van Quang*, undaunted by the imminent dangers dictated by the treacherous weather and the threatening enemy ground fire then being received, ordered the command and control ship to descend to and maintain operation at absolute minimum altitudes so he could effectively direct the emergency extraction. This remarkable display of valorous action and keen tactical sense by a senior field commander exceeds any action required by operational necessity or reasonable limits of safety standards. The extraction was effected with timeliness and without friendly casualties, attesting to the tactical brilliance of Major General *Doan Van Quang*. Except for the courageous determination of Major General *Doan Van Quang*, the extraction doubtlessly would have been aborted. Major General *Doan Van Quang's* outstanding courage and accomplishments are in keeping with the highest standards of true combat excellence and serve to exemplify the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the free world allied military forces.

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XI. SOLDIER'S MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded, posthumously, to:

Private First Class *Donald Taylor*, US24614916, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism on 26 November 1967, in Dora, Alabama. On that date, Private *Taylor*, his sister, and her two small children were in an automobile which Private *Taylor* was driving when he came to a railroad crossing with multiple tracks. Private *Taylor* stopped the automobile and looked up and down the tracks to see if a train was approaching. Not seeing or hearing a train, Private *Taylor* proceeded across the multiple tracks and the car stalled on the last set of tracks. Attempts to start the automobile were unsuccessful, and shortly after it stalled, the headlight of an approaching train was seen. Private *Taylor* shouted for his sister to get out of the automobile and get the children who were in the back seat. The sister got out of the automobile and succeeded in getting her daughter off the back seat and both she and child got clear of the tracks. Private *Taylor* meanwhile was attempting to rescue the second child. Realizing that he could not get the child out of the automobile in time, Private *Taylor* threw his body across that of the small child to protect him when the train hit the automobile. When the train came to a stop after shoving the automobile down the tracks before it, Private *Taylor's* body was lying atop that of the child. Private *Taylor* was dead on arrival at a hospital. The child escaped with minor injuries. This complete disregard for his own life to save that of another reflects great credit upon himself and is in keeping with the highest tradition of the military service.

XII. SOLDIER'S MEDAL. 1. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Specialist Four *James K. Barker*, RA12651355, United States Army, a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 23d Infantry (Mechanized), who, through a heroic effort that endangered his own life, was largely responsible for saving the life of a member of a scout platoon on 29 March 1968. The victim, having become stuck in the quicksand-like mud near the Imjin River, was soon engulfed in the rapidly rising tide of the river. When it became apparent that the man could not be pulled free by ordinary means, Specialist *Barker*, realizing he could himself become trapped in the mud, entered the water to the point where the man was rapidly sinking. Specialist *Barker* remained with him for one and one-half hours, at times disappearing from sight in the rising tide, in an effort to keep the victim from going below the river's surface. Due largely to his efforts, he and the victim were eventually pulled from the deadly trap by a rescue helicopter. Specialist *Barker's* heroic effort served as an inspiration to more than a score of rescuers on the scene and brought great credit to himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist *Barker* as announced in General Orders Number 89, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, APO San Francisco 96301, dated 7 June 1968.)

2. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Captain *Eugene J. Barraro, Jr.*, O5023608 (then First Lieutenant), Transportation Corps, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism on the evening of 17 February 1968 in Giessen, Germany, while serving as a member of United States Army Giessen Support Center. Captain *Barraro* was driving his privately-owned vehicle when he witnessed a hit-and-run accident in which one car went out of control, slammed into a ditch, turned over, and burst into flames. He immediately stopped his vehicle and rushed to the burning car. Two occupants had escaped from the burning automobile, but a third passenger was trapped and injured in the rear seat. Without hesitation or concern for his personal safety, Captain *Barraro* kicked out a window glass and pulled the injured passenger out of the burning car to safety. Through Captain *Barraro's* quick presence of mind, ready courage, and deep concern for the welfare of others, he risked a hazardous action and prevented a possible loss of life. Captain *Barraro's* heroic conduct and prompt action in this emergency situation are in the highest tradition of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes award of the Army Commendation Medal for heroism on 17 February 1968 as announced in General Orders number 89, Headquarters, United States Army Communications Zone Europe, dated 18 May 1968.)

3. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Sergeant *Gunther Bauer*, US52673385, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism on 5 March 1968 at Baker Beach on the Presidio Military Reservation. Sergeant *Bauer* voluntarily risked his life to aid an individual who was helplessly struggling to overcome the treacherous undercurrent and overpowering waves. The rough water, which was extremely cold, and strong undercurrents made swimming very difficult and, coupled with the support of the victim, the task was desperate. Despite these conditions, and with utter disregard for his own life, Sergeant *Bauer* succeeded in rescuing the drowning victim from certain death. First aid was administered immediately by Sergeant *Bauer*, and his heroic conduct and prompt actions were in the highest tradition of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

Specialist Four *Nick Bramos*, US51825168, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism on 5 March 1968 at Baker Beach on the Presidio Military Reservation. Specialist *Bramos* voluntarily risked his life to aid an individual who was helplessly struggling to overcome the treacherous undercurrent and overpowering waves. The rough water, which was extremely cold, and strong undercurrent made swimming very difficult and, coupled with the support of the victim, the task was desperate. Despite these conditions, and with utter disregard for his own life, Specialist *Bramos* succeeded in rescuing the drowning man from certain death. First aid was administered immediately by Specialist *Bramos*, and his heroic conduct and prompt actions were in the high-

est tradition of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army.

5. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant *John T. Carter*, O54341875, Infantry, United States Army, a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 23d Infantry (Mechanized), who, through a heroic effort that endangered his own life, was largely responsible for saving the life of a member of a scout platoon on 29 March 1968. The victim, having become stuck in the quick-sand like mud near the Imjin River, was soon engulfed in the rapidly rising tide of the river. When it became apparent that the man could not be pulled free by ordinary means, Lieutenant *Carter*, realizing he could himself become trapped in the mud, entered the water to the point where the man was rapidly sinking. Lieutenant *Carter* remained with him for one and one-half hours, at times disappearing from sight in the rising tide, in an effort to keep the victim from going below the river's surface. Due largely to his efforts, he and the victim were eventually pulled from the deadly trap by a rescue helicopter. Lieutenant *Carter's* heroic effort served as an inspiration to more than a score of rescuers on the scene and brought great credit to himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Lieutenant *Carter* as announced in General Orders Number 89, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, APO San Francisco 96301, dated 7 June 1968.)

6. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Platoon Sergeant *Alan C. Deaver*, RP6917457, United States Army, who distinguished himself on 10 January 1968 at Range 11, Fort Polk Hand Grenade Range, Fort Polk, Louisiana. As an assistant instructor on the hand grenade range, he was responsible for supervising and assisting trainees in the throwing of a live M26 hand grenade. Assigned as an assistant instructor of five throwing bays, he moved to each bay, insured that each trainee was holding the grenade correctly, instructed him to pull the safety pin, and then observed as the trainee threw the grenade. Upon entering a bay occupied by one of the trainees, Sergeant *Deaver* gave the usual throwing instructions to a trainee. The trainee pulled the pin and prepared to throw. He drew back his arm as to throw, paused, then dropped the grenade to the ground. He then turned and moved rapidly to the throwing bay protective wall and squatted to the ground, covering his head with his arms. Sergeant *Deaver*, realizing the imminent danger to the trainee and himself, saw it was impossible to get the trainee safely out of the bunker. He instinctively and without regard for his own personal safety stepped forward, picked up the live hand grenade and quickly threw it from the bunker. The grenade traveled approximately 15 meters from the bunker and exploded while still in mid-air. Sergeant *Deaver* could have easily stepped to the rear of the throwing area and would have had sufficient cover to protect himself, however, without hesitation or regard for his own personal safety, Sergeant *Deaver* prevented the trainee from being maimed or killed. Sergeant *Deaver's* brave and heroic act reflects great credit upon himself, the Noncommissioned Officer Corps, and the United States Army. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal (First Oak Leaf Cluster) awarded

to Sergeant *Deaver* as announced in General Orders Number 47, 1968, Headquarters US Army Training Center, Infantry and Fort Polk, Fort Polk, Louisiana, as amended by General Orders Number 55, Headquarters, US Army Training Center, Infantry and Fort Polk, dated 20 March 1968).

7. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Sergeant First Class *Howard R. Eldridge*, RA14663146, United States Army, who distinguished himself with his display of extraordinary heroism, on 6 March 1968 at Camp Bobby Thomas near Gunterblum, Germany, by saving several soldiers from death or extreme bodily harm. While acting as Platoon Sergeant during Floating Bridge Training, Sergeant *Eldridge*, without regard for his personal safety, repeatedly waded into the extremely cold water of the Rhine River to rescue several of the 45 soldiers that had been thrown in the river from a light tactical raft accident. The courage and foresight demonstrated by Sergeant *Eldridge* were in the highest traditions of the military service and reflect the utmost credit upon himself, the 249th Engineer Battalion, and the United States Army.

8. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Specialist Five *Richard E. Little*, US53443372, (then Private First Class), United States Army, who, while serving as a Medical Aidman for the 2d Battalion, 37th Armor, 4th Armored Division, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 May 1967 during a field training exercise at Hohenfels, Germany. Two unidentified men from the 3d Infantry Division rushed into the 2d Battalion, 37th Armor mess hall and reported they had heard screams from the impact area of the M79 Grenade Launcher Range. Specialist *Little*, a battalion aidman, who was present in the mess hall, immediately went to the motor pool and procured an armored ambulance, and accompanied by two other Medical Aidmen, rushed to the scene of the accident. Using the armored ambulance to protect themselves as much as possible from further explosions, the three aidmen maneuvered across the two hundred meters of dud-infested impact area to the aid of the injured men. Completely disregarding his own safety, Specialist *Little* dismounted the ambulance and proceeded on foot across the dud-strewn impact area to the first injured man. Specialist *Little* and the other aidmen reached the wounded man and carried him across the dud-strewn area to the ambulance. Then, unhesitatingly, Specialist *Little* crossed the area for a second time to the other injured man who was over fifty feet from the ambulance. When the second man had been loaded into the ambulance, the vehicle was carefully driven out of the impact area to an awaiting helicopter. Although the range was not in use at the time the two men were injured, the danger of personal injury due to grenade explosions was very real. Specialist *Little*'s valiant conduct and swift action in this hazardous situation are in the highest tradition of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist *Little* per General Order Number 125, Headquarters, Fourth Armored Division, APO New York 09326, dated 1 April 1968.)

9. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

First Lieutenant *Elmer R. Moller*, OF110136, Military Intelligence, United States Army, a member of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 23d Infantry (Mechanized), who, through a heroic effort that endangered his own life, was largely responsible for saving the life of a member of his unit on 29 March 1968. The victim, having become stuck in the quicksand-like mud near the Imjin River, was soon engulfed in the rapidly rising tide of the river. When it became apparent that the man could not be pulled free by ordinary means, Lieutenant *Moller*, realizing he could himself become trapped in the mud, entered the water to the point where the man was rapidly sinking. Lieutenant *Moller* remained with the victim for one and one-half hours, at times disappearing from sight in the rising tide, in an effort to keep the victim from going below the river's surface. Due largely to his efforts, he and the victim were eventually pulled from the deadly trap by a rescue helicopter. Lieutenant *Moller's* heroic effort served as an inspiration to more than a score of rescuers on the scene and brought great credit to himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Lieutenant *Moller* as announced in General Orders Number 89, Headquarters, Eighth United States Army, dated 7 June 1968.)

10. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Captain *Truong Van Nhat*, 48A700234, Republic of Vietnam Marine Corps, District Chief, Binh Phuoc District, Long An Province, Republic of Vietnam, who distinguished himself by heroism at Binh Phuoc District on 1 September 1967. Captain *Truong Van Nhat* was a passenger aboard a UH1D helicopter which was engaged in an aerial resupply mission to a Popular Forces outpost. When it crashed, fell onto its port side and began to burn, Captain *Truong Van Nhat*, even though lacking the use of his left arm due to wounds received in a previous combat action, immediately, and with complete disregard for his own personal safety, began to clear debris which had pinned the port door gunner in his position. Through the effort of Captain *Truong Van Nhat*, the door gunner was freed and was assisted to a place of safety. Captain *Truong Van Nhat's* prompt and heroic action in this emergency is in the highest traditions of the United States Army and the Marine Corps of the Republic of Vietnam and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service of the Republic of Vietnam.

11. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Private First Class *Larry G. Smith*, RA19858740, United States Army, a member of the United States Army Armor and Engineer Board, Fort Knox, Kentucky, who distinguished himself by heroism near Pilcher's Landing, Fort Knox, Kentucky, at 1415 hours on 23 April 1968. Private *Smith*, under conditions of extremely high velocity winds and waves up to a height of three feet, voluntarily dived into the Ohio River to save a fellow soldier who had panicked when he was thrown into the river during a test mission for the United States Army Armor and Engineer Board. Private *Smith* stayed with the man, en-

couraged him to make a minimum effort to save himself and, by his own strength, kept the man afloat until they were both pulled from the water. In so doing, Private *Smith* saved the life of his fellow soldier. Private *Smith's* exemplary performance of duty is in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflects great credit upon himself and the military service.

12. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Specialist Four *David E. Stoker*, RA13848199, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism on 10 April 1968 at Fort Monroe, Virginia. At approximately 0300 hours Specialist Stoker was on military police patrol duty in a vehicle that veered off the Fort Monroe seawall and landed on its top in Chesapeake Bay in approximately four feet of water. After successfully escaping from the submerged vehicle, Specialist *Stoker* found that the vehicle operator had not escaped from the vehicle. Specialist *Stoker*, with complete disregard for his own personal safety, immediately submerged and reentered the vehicle. Upon reentry he found the vehicle operator sitting on the inside of the vehicle roof, apparently in a dazed condition. Specialist *Stoker* then pushed him through the broken windshield opening. After surfacing he assisted the enlisted man in walking to a nearby jetty, where they both emerged from the water. Specialist *Stoker* rendered first aid to his companion who was suffering from severe lacerations of the right leg, and then ran to the military police station in search of assistance. Upon arrival of medical authorities both men were taken to the Fort Monroe dispensary and admitted for treatment, Specialist *Stoker* suffering from a severely bruised back and hip. Specialist *Stoker's* sound judgment, prompt action and complete disregard for his own injuries and personal safety resulted in the saving of a human life. His actions were in the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

13. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Specialist Four *Richard Syppolt*, RA13866098 (then Private First Class), United States Army, who, while serving as a Medical Aidman for the 2d Battalion, 37th Armor, 4th Armored Division, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 May 1967 during a field training exercise at Hohenfels, Germany. Two unidentified men from the 3d Infantry Division rushed into the 2d Battalion, 37th Armor mess hall and reported they had heard screams from the impact area of the M79 Grenade Launcher Range. Specialist *Syppolt*, a battalion aidman, who was present in the mess hall, immediately went to the motor pool and procured an armored ambulance, and, accompanied by two other Medical Aidmen, rushed to the scene of the accident. Using the armored ambulance to protect themselves as much as possible from further explosions, the three aidmen maneuvered across the two hundred meters of dud-infested impact area to the aid of the injured men. Completely disregarding his own safety, Specialist *Syppolt* dismounted the ambulance and proceeded on foot across the dud-strewn impact area to the first injured man. Specialist *Syppolt* and the other aidmen reached the wounded man and carried him across the dud-strewn area to the ambulance. Then, unhesitatingly, Specialist *Syppolt* crossed the area

for a second time to the other injured man who was over fifty feet from the ambulance. When the second man had been loaded into the ambulance, the vehicle was carefully driven out of the impact area to an awaiting helicopter. Although the range was not in use at the time the two men were injured, the danger of personal injury due to grenade explosions was very real. Specialist *Sypolt's* valiant conduct and swift action in this hazardous situation are in the highest tradition of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist Four *Sypolt* per General Orders Number 125, Headquarters, Fourth Armored Division, APO New York 09326, dated 1 April 1968.)

14. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant *Freddy J. Watts*, O5430229, Artillery, United States Army, Headquarters 272d Aviation Company, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, who distinguished himself by heroism on 28 September 1967. Lieutenant *Watts*, while traveling near Geraldine, Alabama, came upon the scene of an accident where a truck had crashed through a bridge and plunged 60 feet into Town Creek. As a result of recent heavy rains, the creek was approximately 20 feet deep with strong swift currents. Lieutenant *Watts*, without hesitation, jumped into the rain-swollen creek and assisted a State Trooper in removing the two occupants to the top of the truck which was loaded with gasoline, further adding danger to the rescue operations. At this time another State Trooper paddled a small boat to the truck and after loading the two men into the boat, it capsized in the treacherous water. One of the State Troopers became tangled in a rope tied to the boat and was pulled under the swift water. Lieutenant *Watts*, with complete disregard for his safety, dived under the water, untangled the officer and removed him to the safety of the creek bank where he gave him artificial respiration. Later, Lieutenant *Watts* entered the swift currents again and assisted in removing the other men to safety. Lieutenant *Watts* through his voluntary risk of life, was instrumental in saving the lives of two men. His courageous act and complete disregard for his safety reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

15. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the Act of Congress, approved 2 July 1926, a Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy is awarded to:

Specialist Five *Johnny S. Wilham*, US58440043, (then Specialist Four), United States Army, who, while serving as a Medical Aidman for the 2d Battalion, 37th Armor, 4th Armored Division, distinguished himself by heroism on 8 May 1967 during a field training exercise at Hohenfels, Germany. Two unidentified men from the 3d Infantry Division rushed into the 2d Battalion, 37th Armor mess hall and reported they had heard screams from the impact area of the M79 Grenade Launcher Range. Specialist *Wilham*, a battalion aidman, who was present in the mess hall, immediately went to the motor pool and procured an armored ambulance, and, accompanied by two other Medical Aidmen, rushed to the scene of the accident. Using the armored ambulance to protect themselves as much as possible from further explosions, the three aidmen maneuvered across the two hundred meters of dud-infested impact area to the aid of the injured men. Completely disregarding his own safety,

Specialist *Wilham* dismounted the ambulance and proceeded on foot across the dud-strewn impact area to the first injured man. (This award supersedes the Army Commendation Medal awarded to Specialist Five *Wilham* per General Order Number 125, Headquarters, Fourth Armored Division, APO New York 09326, dated 1 April 1968.)

XIII--BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal for heroism in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded posthumously to:

Captain *William F. Eisenbraun*, O4014803, Infantry, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force while serving as Sub-sector Advisor, Tu Nghia District, Quang Ngai Province, Vietnam. On 1 June 1965 Captain *Eisenbraun* accompanied a mixed force of Army, Republic of Vietnam and Regional Force troops during an attack on Tu Hien Village. Captain *Eisenbraun* performed in a heroic manner, constantly exposing himself to enemy fire. As the force neared its objective the troops were reluctant to commence the assault across the open rice paddies. Captain *Eisenbraun*, armed only with a 45 caliber pistol, ran to the front shouting "Mau len, Mau len", "Let's go". Captain *Eisenbraun's* bravery under fire inspired the troops and they immediately followed him in the assault. When the attack was stopped by heavy Viet Cong fire, he advised his counterpart to assault the objective by fire and maneuver. After three attempts failed, the Vietnamese Commander gave the order to withdraw. Captain *Eisenbraun*, showing great courage and remaining calm and cool, advised him on the proper methods of withdrawal. He covered the withdrawal of the last element, placing himself constantly in a position of great danger. He remained in position until he had emptied the weapons of three wounded men. During the whole withdrawal the Viet Cong fire was heavy and continuous. The heroic and courageous actions of Captain *Eisenbraun*, along with the timely and excellent advice he gave his counterpart, resulted in the saving of many lives and certainly saved the attack force from a great number of casualties. The continual courage and selflessness displayed by Captain *Eisenbraun* reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Army and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

XIV--BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal for heroism in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded posthumously to:

Staff Sergeant *Leonard M. Tadios*, RA10106541, United States Army, who distinguished himself by heroism in connection with military operations against

a hostile force while serving as an advisor with the 31st Infantry Regiment, 21st Infantry Division, Republic of Vietnam. On 11 December 1964, the 3d Battalion of the 31st Infantry Regiment, to which Sergeant *Tadlos* was assigned as Light Weapons Infantry Advisor, was ordered to proceed from Vi Thanh, Chuong Thien Province, to reinforce two regional force companies about 15 miles distant which were under Viet Cong attack. While proceeding east in a truck convoy to the destination, the rear elements of the convoy, consisting of the Reconnaissance Platoon, Headquarters Company, and the First Company, were ambushed at 1515 hours by a vastly superior Viet Cong force known to consist of three battalions. The available friendly forces deployed immediately to counter the assault which developed from the south. Sergeant *Tadlos* proceeded to his duty station with his Commanding Officer, Senior Advisor, 3d Battalion, 31st Regiment. After about 15 minutes his Commanding Officer was wounded by mortar fragments. Sergeant *Tadlos* took immediate action to bind the wounds. As the action continued and the Viet Cong pressed the attack, it became evident that the Viet Cong Forces would overrun the Headquarters Group. Several Vietnamese soldiers requested that Sergeant *Tadlos* join them in falling back to a more defensible position. Sergeant *Tadlos* displayed a complete disregard for his life and showed extreme devotion and loyalty by refusing to abandon his stricken Commander. Instead, he elected to remain with him in order to give first aid, and as a result was captured by the enemy. By his courageous act Sergeant *Tadlos* brought great credit upon the Non-Commissioned Officers Corps, himself, and the United States Army, and his devotion to duty is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

XV. BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal for heroism in connection with military operations against hostile forces is awarded to:

Sergeant First Class *Francisco J. Salas*, RA50098071 (then Staff Sergeant), United States Army, who distinguished himself by a heroic act while a member of the United States Army Special Photographic Detachment, Pacific, on 31 January 1968. On this date the Viet Cong had unleashed the TET Offensive in Saigon, Republic of Vietnam. Sergeant *Salas* voluntarily entered known areas of enemy concentrations in order to document on motion picture film the situation as it existed and the United States Army's attempt to expel the Viet Cong. One such incident occurred at BOQ3, a short distance from Tan Son Nhut Air Base, where approximately eighteen heavily armed Viet Cong were entrenched. Sergeant *Salas*, disregarding his own personal safety and exposing himself continuously to hostile enemy fire, advanced with the Army unit whose mission it was to rid the Viet Cong from BOQ3. Although the Army unit sustained fifteen killed in action in the area of his operation, Sergeant *Salas* maintained his position, capturing on film this vital engagement. By this heroic act Sergeant *Salas* displayed the outstanding qualities of dedication and leadership and the resultant product is a worthy example of his professional competence. Sergeant *Salas*' actions reflect great credit upon himself, the United States Army Special Photographic Detachment, Pacific, and the United States Army.

XVI. BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 11046, 24 August 1962, a Bronze Star Medal for

meritorious service in ground operations against hostile forces is awarded posthumously to:

Lieutenant Colonel *Glenn D. McElroy*, O1936247, Infantry, United States Army. December 1965 to February 1966.

XVIII--AIR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A, 11 September 1942, an Air Medal with "V" device for heroism while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Major *George W. Grill, Jr.*, FV3037409, United States Air Force, who distinguished himself while participating in aerial flight in the Republic of Vietnam on 17 February 1967. Major *Grill* was flying on a reconnaissance mission in an A1E Skyraider near the Cambodian Border when he was informed that enemy ground fire had downed two light scout helicopters nearby. He immediately went to the aid of the downed pilots, flying dangerously close to hostile anti-aircraft positions to accurately place his ordnance near the crash sites, thus keeping insurgent forces from approaching the stranded Americans. Major *Grill* persisted in his dauntless aerial attack in the face of intensive enemy fire until a rescue party arrived. His display of fearless airmanship, heroism, and wholehearted concern for his comrades are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Air Force.

XIX--AIR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942, as amended by Executive Order 9242-A,

11 September 1942, an Air Medal for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight is awarded by the Department of the Army to:

Major *Paul M. Grace*, O78323, Artillery, United States Army. September 1967 to March 1968.

XX--ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL. 1. By direction of the Secretary of the Army, under the provisions of paragraph 33, AR 672-5-1, the Army Commendation Medal, with "V" device for heroism is awarded to:

Commissaryman First Class *Thomas F.
