MERITORIOUS UNIT COMMENDATION. By direction of the Secretary of the Army, under the provisions of paragraph 203, AR 672-5-1, the Meritorious Unit Commendation is awarded the following named units of the United States Army for exceptionally meritorious achievement in the performance of outstanding service during the periods indicated:

1. HEADQUARTERS AND HEADQUARTERS COMPANY, UNITED STATES ARMY REGIONAL COMMUNICATIONS GROUP (VIETNAM).

The citation reads as follows:

HEADQUARTERS AND HEADQUARTERS COMPANY, UNITED STATES ARMY REGIONAL COMMUNICATIONS GROUP (VIET-NAM) distinguished itself in support of military operations in the Republic of Vietnam during the period 1 January 1967 to 31 July 1968. The officers and men of the company demonstrated dynamic leadership and technical competence in the superior operation of the entire strategic communications system supporting allied forces in the I. II, III, and IV Corps tactical zones. By exercising command and control of their vital area of responsibility, they provided high-quality, long-distance communications service to subscribers throughout the theater, fulfilling requirements of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Defense Communications Agency and the military services. Despite immense obstacles involved with construction operations during the torrential monsoon season and frequent encounters with enemy activity, the personnel of the unit successfully completed numerous top priority projects. Through outstanding initiative, uncommon versatility and rapid adjustment to changing tactical requirements, the men of the 577TH ENGINEER BATTALION maintained the highest emergency repair and construction rates possible in furthering their vital engineering mission. Their superior planning and sound application of engineering skills were manifested in the construction of essential bridges. airfields and fire support bases and in the restoration and maintenance of key highways and important access roads. Through their unrelenting perseverance, singular initiative and consummate knowledge of engineering concepts, the organization's personnel contributed immeasurably to the free world struggle against Communist aggression in the Republic of Vietnam.
